Such errors happen more easily when a man permits his counter to become littered with drugs not wanted for immediate use. It is safer to clear the counter after each order is filled. The worst possible habit for a druggist, however, is to remember prescriptions already compounded. When a man attempts the feat of think ing about an old prescription while he is at work on a new one, he is in a fair way of committing a murderous blun-

der."
