about 245,000 acres in all, of which a little over 80,000 acres are under cultivation, about an equal amount of forest and savannahr while the remain-der lies fallow. This fallow land was at one time cleared of trees and broken at one time cleared of trees and broken by the plow: in later days it has been permitted to remain untilled, and in many places is overgrown by shrubs and ferns and vigorous second growth of trees. The surface of the island is rugged and mountainous, the shores steep and precipitous. Great promontories and headlands project out to sea, inclosing deep bays and narrow inlets.
