Not Captivated by Country Life. In truth, there is no country life in America in the English sense of the There are plenty of wealthy people with little or nothing to occupy their time. But they have not taken to the soil, and that pleasant autumn round of hospitality which the American lady so admires in England is practically unknown in the states. Hospitality of the most lavish description is practiced by our kindly kinsfolk. But it is exercised in town, or at the seaside, where happily, hotel life is rapidly being displaced by "cottage" or villa housekeeping. If the well-introduced tourist visits New York or Boston any time between June

and October, the chances are that he will find the brown-stone fronted acuse to which his letters are addressed closed. The ladies, at all events, will be at Newport, or Saratoga, or Atlantic City, or Long Branch, or at their summer place on the Hudson. The head of the house, if still in town, will take a running trip now and then to see them, or, if the place is close at hand, will come in and go out twice a day. If less wealthy, they may be found at a seaside hotel, or a "mountain resort," or as "summer boarders" in a farm-house. But anything like a stated migration to a country-house in the midst of the owner's own woods and fields and coverts, not to return until April or May, is almost

unknown. The reason of this is mainly that the Americans have not yet been captivated on their town houses, and build yachts which are marvels of luxury. But the idea of laying out an estate and living on it does not attract them. They buy "real estate"—to keep and sell at a profit, not to enjoy it. The institutions of the states are against this. As the entire eaamong his heirs, the accumulation of land is surrounded by difficulties, and the country is advancing so rapidly that the chances are in favor of the owner being tempted to sell his park for a city site or to run a railway through his garden. Nor must it be forgotten that the English landowner, with his inherited rank and responsibilities, has bonds binding him to the soil which are unknown to the wealthiest American. The latter has no farms to look after, no tenants to arrange with, no "position in the county" to keep up.—London News.

The Fuel of the Future.

It is a fact well known in manufacturing circles that the vast bulk of the heat contained in coal is wasted. Only fourteen out of the hundred carbon is actually utilized. Hence, one of the problems of chemistry has been to get more power, in the way of heat and light, out of a given quality of coal.

Professor T. S. C. Lowe claims to have solved this problem, a matter which is of vast importance, if it is a fact. The process is to pulverize the coal, and, in converting it into a gas, the coal is reduced to a powdered form so fine that it will float in the atmosphere, and it is carried into the burning furnace by a current of air artificially produced. In the powdered form e thing is consumed, as it makes no smoke and leaves no ashes. This would utilize the mountains of so-called waste, now piled up near coal mines and manu

But Professor Lowe's invention goes farther. The coal is converted into a water gas. A ton of anthracite coal will generate from eighty to a hundred cubic feet of gas. The cost will be about 9 cents a cubic foot. This invention is already in use in the city of Troy, in the laundries of that place, and is also used for power and for heating and cooking in hotels and festaurants The gas furnished is son-luminous and resembles that from alcohol. It has no odor and is intensely hot. These facts have come out in a report to the Scranton board of trade, which calls the new invention anthracite gas. The result will be a marvelous economy in the heating of houses and the cooking of food, while one ton of coal will go as far as a handred of tons nowadays. Demorrat's Monthly.


