The female pickpockets are the most successful workers in crowded stores. They are generally in pairs and are known as the "stall" and her "wire." The "stall" is generally a respectable looking, well dressed woman, who is always in a harry and axious to available goods. hurry and anxious to examine goods at a counter crowded with customers. She talks to her "wire" in a patronizing way. The "wire" calls her miss or madam, all of which impresses the crowd with the "stall's" importance, and in a hustling. bustling sort of way she forces herself through the crowd, tosses the goods around the counter, attracts the attention of the customers and distracts the attention of the salespeople, while the "wire' gets her work in on the pockets or carries away a stray caba. There are probably more pocketbooks picked off of counters than are taken from pockets or cabas. The detectives in the large establishments are always on the lookout for the "shawl racket." This is generally worked by women who dress plainly and have the appearance of hard working and honest housewives. They generally work around the handkerchief counter, where they can easily toss the goods. "Sometimes new hands will work the stores, but we can generally get on to them, for thieves are always suspicious and will always look around to see that no one is watching before they begin operations. If they think any one is spetting them, they will begin spotting themselves.

There have been a great many changes in the manufacture of tobacco since I began the business, forty two years ago. In making plug tobaccothen hand power

presses were used in place of the hydraulic machines now in use. It took merly necessary boys and girls are now employed; no special skilkis required, the only thing needed being attention. Now adays the process through which the leaf passes before making its appearance as plug tobacco is very different from that of the olden time. To-day the leaf is first stemmed and run through gum rollers of immense size, then laid on a rack and put into dry houses, after which it is steamed, flavored and bulked. After remaining in huge masses for twentyfour hours it is passed through the molding machines and made into plays.

twenty-five years ago, and has since become general, so that now all plug and tine cut tobacco is more or less adulterated. The burley leaf, named, I believe, after one of the pioneer growers, is now about the only kind of tobacco raised. It is a larger leaf, more apongy and has not as much nicotine as the older and now forgetten varieties, such as the "Yellow Prior," "Little Frederick" and the "Orinico," The greater part of the burley is raised in Missouri, Kentucky and Ohio. The use of tobacco has increased at a wonderful rate in recent years, and I believe is now better than eyer before. At present the market is suffering from overproduction, and as a consequence the prices are lower than Henry Dansman in Globe-Democrat.


