
ITS QUARTER CENTENARY.

Hot Fighting from Cedar Mountain to Chantilly.

The Campaign Begins at Cedar Mountain, the 9th of August, 1862-It Ends September 1-Fighting Every Step of the Way-The Three Days' Battles at Bull Run, Gainesville, Groveton and Manassas.

It was a quarter of a century ago on June 26 that Maj. Gen. John Pope was appointed to command the Army of Virginia. The scattered forces of Banks, Fremont and, McDowell that had been demoralized by the movements of Stonewall Jackson in the Shenandoah valley were to to be united into one army, the Army of Virginia, and put under one head. That head was Gen. Pope. There were three cops under the com-manders named. Eronout resigned when Pope was appointed, and his corps—the First— —was given to Gen. Franz Sigel. Banks com-manded the Second corps. McDoweli the Third. The three contained altogether not quite 50,000 men. of volunteers, and the district of Northern Missouri was placed in his charge. After-ward he commanded the Army of the Missis-sippl. In March, 1862, he was promoted to be major general of volunteers. From these experiences he was yalled east in June and placed at the head of the Army of Virginia. He was to reorganize and consolidate it. I July he became a brigadier general in the regular army.

At the close of the campaign, which is the

subject of this chapter in war history, in September, 1862, Gen. Pope requested to be relieved of the command of the Army of Virginia and go back west. He was permitted to do so, and received back his old command in the northwest. He is now retired from the

Pope assumed his new duties with enthusiasm. From the first he and Mod ballon dis-

The differences became serious. At last both generals requested that a commander in chief be appointed over them and over all the armies. This was done, and July 2: Gen. Henry W. Pope, on taking command of the Virginia army, announced that his headquarters would be in the saldle. He further issued a

proclamation to the soldiers:
"I have dome from the west," he told them "where we have always seen the backs of our enemies, from an army whose business has been to seek the adversary and heat him when found, whose policy has been attack and not defense." Gen. Pope issued orders from Washington to his army, but did not join it in person till

Another declared that non-combatants in the neighborhood of the army should be held responsible for damage to military property, guerrilla attacks on soldiers, and all arts of private hostility. A third bulletin ordered that all the male inhabitants within the lines of his army should take the oath of alle giance to the United States government. Those who refused were to be sut out of the lines. Whoever took the oath and violated it was to be shot. The Confederate government lad issued orders similar to these in Tennessee, nearly a year before.

Pope began military operations by bringing the detachments of his army searce tegether, making a line some forty miles long. Sigels and Banks corps were posted at Sperryville, which will be seen upon the map. Ricketts division of McDowells corps was placed twenty miles east of this, at Waterko bridge over the north fork of the Rappahameck, while Gen. Rafus King's division of McDowell's corps was left at Prederickshure. It is an unfortunate circumstance belonging to this part of the history of the war that there was ill feeling among several of the generals with the armies of the cast. This had its influence on the campaign of Virginia. McCollan had the gift of attaching men to him enthandatically. His influence over many of the officers under him was unbounded.

MAP OF POPE'S VIRGINIA CAMPAIGN Aug. 9, 1862, the battle of Cedar Mountain the first in Pope's Virginia campaign, was fought. Sigel had been ordered to march to Culpepper Aug. 8, but mistook his orders and did not reach there till the afternoon of the 1th. That afternoon the battle opened with an attack from Ewell's division on Banks. Banks held possession of a hill near Cedar mountain. Ewell planted a battery on Cedar mountain to rake the Union forces. Part of Ewell's and Jackson's divisions took position on a ridge opposite the hill occupied by the Federal troops. The battle began with a sharp artillery fire at 4 o'clock. A corn field and a wheat field lay between the two armies, Jackson's old troops called sometimes Lad. 9th. That afternoon the battle opened with Jackson's old troops, called sometimes "Jack-He was killed early in the action, and his command devolved on Gen

Taliaferra. Cedar mountain is called by the Confederates Slaughter mountain. Banks' men were-posted on the hill mentioned and on the plaige near Cedar run, a stream crossing the Cul-pepper road. The attack was ordered by Stonewall Jackson, who, in his report, say: that, finding only a part of Pope's army at Culpepper Court House, he hoped, through the blessing of Providence, to defeat it before re-enforcements came up. In this fight Jackson had his own old division and those of Hill and Ewell, nearly 25,000 men in all, the best and most experienced soldiers of the army of the Confederacy. Banks had less than 9,000 men, consisting of Williams and Augur's divisions, with Gordon's brigade no 1,500, posted as a reserve on the extreme





### A New Fiber Plant.

According to a report of Consul Burch, and, of Ruatan, in Honduras, the pita plant has never been cultivated, but grows wild in patches on the borders of rivers and lagoous. The stalks of the Plant contain the fiber of commerce grain commit the fiber of commerce, and grow sometimes to a bright of twelve-test. The Indians semape off the hard skin of the stalk with a bamboo knife, and thus obtain the inbers which form the heart of the stalk. Another plan is to steen the stalks in water until the sl decomposes: but this is said to injure the fiber somewhat.

In recent years machines have been devised to decorticate the filer, but these have all been failure, overing to the fact that no machine has yet been invente capable of operating on a profitable scale fiber is used chiefly for thread, nets, fish have been manufactured into lace hand-kerchiefs, ribbons and wigs. It is held to be a substitute for silk or linen; and if proper machinery were forthcoming, the wild pita fields of Honduras might be utilized in commerce. Consul Burchard indeed expresses the opinion that the fiber is destined to become a very imand industry of this country. - Scientific

### Army Pigeon Lofts.

The militarists of Europe have a new fad. Having exhausted their ingenuity increasing the size of guns for mayal and land siege purposes, and having per-fected the field telegraph and field hospital service, no army in Europe is now considered to be in a proper condition to take the field without an abundant sup ply of pigeons. The pigeon loft is part of the regular paraphernalia of every German garrison now; the French ; propriate large amounts annually for the birds, and every government in Europe is in the race to secure the best carrier pigeon service. The French, indeed, at siege of Paris utilized the birds continually, and quite long dispatches, comtiminary, and quie nong urspaceurs, con-pressed into a small space by photograph-ic reduction, were sent, one bird carry-ing during the siege as many as 40,000 mesones safely. A the pigeons average forty to forty five miles an bour, it is apparent that they are of greater service than balloens, since they possess the quality of dirigibility.—Chicago Times.

There is said to be a very promising pening for lumbermen in the northern ortion of Asiatic Turkey. The principal kinds of wood supplied are the Fox and walnut tree, which fetch, on an average, wantil tree, which letch, on an average, 160 francs a ton, delivered on the sensitere, and oak of various qualities, the price of which varies between 60 and 75 francs per cubic—meter, delivered at any place in Europe, where the price is at present 120 and 180 francs.
