It seems that O'Conner was at a dance which he left to go home for his flute to furnish music for the festivities. murderer is William Eagan, aged 23, employed at the Grand Rapids & Judianna car shops. His arrest was caused through a hint dropped to a friend by Minnie Dyer, a girl who attended the dance. The police were told of the hint, which implicated Eagan, but were unable to find her. They arrested Eagan, told him the girl had confessed all, and he broke down. It appears that Eagan and O'Connor had a quarrel a few weeks ago over a girl at a dance, and when O'Connor left the house for his flute Flacan followed him out. Words passed. a quarrel ensued, and Eagan claims O'Con-nor struck him first. He retaliated with a blow which knocked him down, and foliowed it up by pounding the prostrate form. When he desisted he saw that O'Connor did not move, and returning the house without attracting attention he called aside his girl, Minnie Dyer, and took her to the body. The worst part of the latter end of the tragedy is that after seeing that life was extinct they both reamusement, staying until the party broke
