Ceremonies Performed at the Conse cration of a P rice Fre Temple. The Bombay papers contain ac-

counts of the consecration there recently of a new temple erected for the reinstatement of the sacred Adaran fire, says the London Times. The fire was installed in 1773 by Manockjee Nowrojee Shett The old building showing signs of decay it was replaced by a new one at a cost of about a lakh of rupees by Mr. Jalbhoy Ardeseer, the eighth fineal descendant of the founder. It is built in the ancient three recognized classes of Parsee sacred fires in India, has to undergo certain ceremonials corresponding to the dignity of the order to which it is destined to belong. Thus, only a thirtieth part roughly of the expenditure and religious recitation would be required to consecrate a Dadgan installed.

The most ancient fire at present in India is at the secluded village of Oodwada, near Pulsar, and the Par-sees make it a point to repair to the Beheram fire there in large numbers during the months which are especially allotted to the presiding genius of fire. It was consecrated about twelve conturies ago by the ancestors of the present Parsees in commemoration of the voyage that they had in their emigration from Persia to India. priests vowed to institute the fire in the event of their ships landing them in safety on Indian soil. The fire is fed at five stated times each twentyfour hours, with sandal wood, ben-zoine and quantities of other odorous materials, as well as with very dry This, however, can not be done without previous compliance with certain religious formulas.

Next in rank to the Beheram fire is the Adaran, the one reinstated recently in Bomay. It is placed in a large silver censer, estimated to have cost about 7,000 rupees. The hall in which it is placed could not be entered except by the officiating priest or his immediate assistant. While the building was under construction the Adaran fire was removed to a place set apart for the purpose and for the use of the priests in charge. All the arrangements for the removal and reinstatement to the new temple were made under The directions of the hereditary priest officiating in the temple. After the ceremony was over one of the priests read, on the priestly community making use of the fire temple, an address of congratulation to Mr. Jalbhoy Ardeseer, and presented him with a flower vase as a memento of the occasion. The majority of the Parsecs then adjourned partake of the "chasnee," which building was illuminated at night.

#### RUSHING FOR THE LAND.

One of the chief explanations of the increasing popularity of the Northwest of this continent for farming operations is the diversity of country which it offers. Nature has so fushioned it that every branch of farming in the temperate zone has been provided with a locality. And the extent of country locality. And the extent of country adapted to agriculture is a revelation to those who not many years ago thought that Minnesota was the boundary of agricultural land and that wheat-growing was doubtful even in Minnesota. Bevond Minnesota, across the boundary, the Canadian territorie of Manitoba, Assiniboia, Alberta an Saskatchewan are claiming pre-emi-nence in wheat, in cattle raising, and in mixed farming. Manitoba this year has outstripped the rest of the world in the quantity and quality of her barvest.

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

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
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
