The shock of the explosion was tremendous. The whole city was shaken and houses swayed on their foundations as though from the effects of an earthquake. The building in which the gun cotton had been stored was nowhere to be seen. It had been blown into spiinters. Nine work-men were in the building when the explosion took place and every one of them

The decision results from the arrest of Capt. Rabshaw at Chicago last summer for violation of the contract labor law. Little short of a revolution will be caused in the carrying trade of the lakes, as many hundreds of Canadians have been employed every year on American vessels.

Dipatch from Chicago: At about halfpast 6 o'clock on the evening of the 1st, the sky, which had been threatening all the afternoon, became black as night and in another minute a terrible cloudburst occurred. The wind blew at a hurr-cane rate and drove the rain in sheets along the s. rets, sweeping every movable object be-fore it. The wind was of cyclonic force and at the corner of Halstead and Peirce streets tore down a house and killed three people. The building was a seven-story brick structure. It was surrounded by one and two-story frame and brick build ings, the homes of humble laborers. crashing upon them instantly crushed out

the lives of several unfortunates Thomas Hulett lived immediately in the rear of the ruined seven-story brick building. He and his family, together with two guests, were at supper. When the immense mass of brick, iron, wood and plaster composing the larger building fell, forces seemed to be directed to the rear, immediately upon the Hulett residence A passer by, as soon as the accident oc-curred, turned in a fire alarm and a police and ambulance call. Citizens who heard the crash and the cries and moans of the injured also rushed to the scene and the work of the rescue was at once begun. Three children were found dead and all the others severely if not fatally injured. In the two story residence adjoining the demolished structure lived the families of Horace Wigant, James Mott and James McGowan. All were in the building except the 8-year old Lizzie Mott and nore escaped serious injury. James McGowan, his invalid wife and Mary Walsh, Mrs. McGowan's nurse and Samuel Evisade are buried in the ruins, and are feared

to be dead. Kansas City: The town of Towarda was wiped off the face of the earth and Augusta, a few miles distant, was almost destroyed by a most terrible and destructive cyclone. Not a house or building was left standing in Towarda. The town was asleep when the storm swept down, razed everything in its path and left dead bodies lying in its wake. Four dead bodies have been recovered from the ruins already searched. Twenty persons are fatally hurt and 40 more seriously injured besides a large number more or less maimed. 



A HUMAN soul without education is like marble in the quarry, which shows none of its inherent beauties till the skill of the polisher fetches out the colors, makes the surface shine, and discovers every ornamental cloud, spot and vein that runs through the body of it.

Surely nobody can always know what is right. Yes, you always can for to-day; and if you do what you see of it to day you will see more of it and more clearly to-morrow; but when the body, overcharged with the excess of yesterday, weighs down the mind, and depresses to the earth any portion of the divine spirit we had been endowed with, we lack the wish and the will to see the right way and follow it.

Ir would help to reduce the vast heap of needless nuisances with which the world is made unwholesome and intolerable to the many if that sentimental courtesy we affect to show the 'sickly" and 'ailing" few could be minimized. It is no kindness to give way to the whims and accept the back excuses of the 'not very well.'
