RESOLVED, That the insinuation con tained in said communication implying that any member of this club would enthat any member of this club would engage in so degrading and disreputable a business for the "mighty dollar," is hurled back with contempt as only worthy one who will stand behind the ber where he says "our boys call for

RESOLVED. That the liquor patronage which the writer says consists in part of minors should be warned that they are minors should be warned that they are aiding and abetting said saloon, in ita disregard for all law, both moral and legal, and asked to abstain from further aiding a business which is in no sense a factor of productive industry, but a barnacle on the body politic, feeding on the honest industry for support.

RESOLVED. 
