CHAUNCEY DON'T WANT IT.

1The correspondent of the New York Herald writes from Washington as follows: "Chauncey M. Depew has positively declined the office of secretary of state. It was offered him by the President when Mr. Depew was here recently and Mr. Depew requested a few days to think it over. The result of this thinking is that he cannot give up his important bus ness rela ions for the barren honor of a title and \$8,000 a year. He has made this fact known to the President and all hope of securing his services at the head of the cabinet has been abandoned. The friend who telegraphed here before Mr. Depew came on that he would accept the place appears to lave acted with some excess of zeal without positive assurances from Mr. Depew.

Mr. Foster has had practical charge of most of the important negotiations of the past three years and would need no apprenticeship at his duties. Colonel Hay lives in a handsome house here on the opposite side of Lafayette park from the white house and would enjoy the honor of a brief tenure in the highest executive office in the government below that of the President.

AGBICULTURAL BILL DISPOSED OF. The agricultural appropriation bill was disposed of by the Senate, except as to one amendment on which action has been reserved till the Senate meets again on Monday. 
