SEVEN KILLED.

loiler Explosion in a Canadian Stave Mil with Awful Results.

By the explosion of a boiler in Force & Dickinson's stave mill at Staples, Ont, seven men were instantly killed. one was fatally and four somewhat in jured. Forty more men narrowly escaped death. The men had been gathered in the boiler-room waiting for the time to commence work. Just as they were leaving the room came the explosion that completely wrecked the mill and that was heard for more than five miles.

The bodies were removed from the The bodies were removed from the debris by people whose attention was attracted by the noise of the explosion. The seven dead men were horribly mangled and disfigured beyond recognition. The right was most sickening. The bodies were in a terrible condition. Arms and legs were scattered in all directions and it was with difficulty that they were collected and placed with their proper bodies. In addition to the seven dead and the one man who was seriously injured five others were was seriously injured five others were caught in the wreck and more or less bruised and scalded. Had the accident occurred 15 minutes sooner, before the

occurred 15 minutes sooner, before the men had started to leave the boiler-room, probably 50 men would have been killed.

The mill, together with its machinery, is a total wreck. One portion of the boiler was carried 200 yards, passing two residences. Bricks, shingles and pieces of iron were thrown hundreds of yards.

KILL GOV. FLOWER.

That was the Intention of a Villain Who Sent Him an Infernal Machine. -

The life of Gov. Roswell -P. Flower, of New York, was threatened by an infernal machine sent to him at the Windsor hotel. New York. The box which contained the machine is now in the possession of Chief Inspector Steers at police headquarters, together with the infernal machine and its mechanical arrangements. A large number of detectives have been put on the case. Every effort is being made to suppress the fact that the box left at the Windsor hotel contained a deadly machine and enough giant powder to blow the governor into eternity. The detectives took the machine down to police headquarters and delivered it to the inspector, who put it in a pail of water and left it there to soak. A lever was connected with the cover of the box, and when the latter would be raised three parlor matches fastened to the lever would be rubbed against a piece of emery paper on the side of the box and ignited, thus causing the explosion of the powder. The inspector said If the box had been opened as was intended an ex-plosion would certainly have followed. No less than 20 detectives are working on the case. It is said that a letter was received by Gov. Flower before the package was left at the hotel, warning him to be careful if he received a box, and implying that an attempt would be made on his life.

Alexander Bergman, the anarchist, who tried to kill II. C. Frick, was placed on trial in the criminal court at Pittsburg. Bergman looked well and was as cool as any one present. He pleaded not guilty to the six charges of felonious assault and battery, entering a building with felonious intent, and carrying concealed weapons. He had no counsel and preferred to conduct his own case.

H. C. Frick was the first witness. He told of Bergman's visit to the office previous to the shooting and recited in a graphic manner the story of the attempted assassination. Vice-Chairman Leishman, the only one present when the assault was made, in the main corrobated the evidence given by Mr. Frick.


