INDIAN AFFAIRS.

The work of the Indian Bureau, in the execution of the policy of recent legislation, has been largely directed to two chief purposes: First, the allotment of lands in severalty to the Indians and the cession to the United States of the surfius lands, and, secondly, to the work of educating the Indians for their own protection in closer contact with the white man, and for the intelligent exercise of his new citizenship, Allotments have been made and patents issued to 5.990 Indians under the present secretary and commissioner, and 7.690 additional allotments have been made for which patents are now in process of preparation. The school attendance of Indian children has been increased during that time over 13 per cent, the earoliment for 1892 being nearly 20, 1000. A uniform system of school textbooks and of study has been adopted, and the work in these national schools brought as near as may be to the basis of the free schools can be transferred and merged into the common schools of the states. The report of the Commissioner of Possions, to which extanded notice is given by the Secretary of the Interior in his report, will attract great attention. Judged by the aggregate amount of work done, the last year has been the greatest in the history of the office. I believe that the organization of the office is efficient and that the work has been done with fidelity. The passage of what is known as the disability bill has, as was foreseen, very largely increased the annual disburgements to the disabled veterans of the civil war. The estimate for this fiscal year was \$14.856.00, and that amount was appropriated. A deficiency amounting to 100,058,521 must be provided for at this assion. The estimate for pensions for the fiscal year ending June 20, 1284, is 185,00,00.000. The Commissioner of Possions believes that, if the present legislation and methods are maintained and further additions to the pension laws are not made, the maximum expenditure for pensions will be reached June 20, 1284, and will be

There is certainly something wrong shout the management of sidewalks. Who do the sidewalks belong to, or rather, who unsatisfactory and expensive nature of law ought to build the sidewalks? We contend that the city or village ought to do about our roads, but it is not by those who it. The land in front of a man's property, do the work of keeping them in repair. All that between his fence and that of his should be taxed to maintain good roads. It neighbor across the way, does not belong to him but to the village or city. The village or city authorities build and maintain the roadway, why not the sidewalks? They are used in common by everybody. The owner may use the walk in front of his place little, while his neighbor across the way uses it much; and that neighbor across the way not have a sidewalk in front of his place, though he be much more able to own and maintain one.

The village or city authorities pretend to control the sidewalk business; say when a man shall build or repair; of what width; whether it shall be constructed of boards, planks, tar, gravel, cement, brick or stone. They do not take into consideration the condition of a man's finances but if he does not do as they require they do it themselves and charge the expense up, to be spread upon the tax roll. This is all wrong. As the land belongs to the village or city they ought to build and maintain the sidewalks.
