In the case of the people's bank of Manchester, Mr. Allen Bros. of Cambridge, before Circuit Court Commissioner Sampson, a settlement was effected. The court took a judgment against the Allen brothers for possession of the farm, and agreed that no writ of garnishment should issue in the name of the bank. A lease for one year in the sum of \$800 was made out to the bank to be paid inside that time. —Times.

The old adage reliable and popular, "Trust me, I'll pay," has been discredited in Ohio. A man, who had been doing business in Clinton, has been dissolved and a new corporation has been formed to keep his old business up to date.

They condemn the plan of employing convicts on the highways, one object being the facility with which convicts could effect their escape and the cost of maintenance outside of prison walls.

The removal of the ball and chain would be demanded to the convict and the observer.

The special committee of the house which were investigating subjects connected with the general management of prisoners in this state, in spite of the great opposition made by labor organizations and certain manufacturers, has rendered a decided cast in favor of convict labor and even go so far as to recommend that prisoners in county jails shall be employed in the state's service. —Times.

The committee's report demands the cultivation of flowers at Lansing and the manufacture of cheap soap as are imported from foreign countries.

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The house committee of the state agreed to the general fishing bill of Representative Robertson. It provides that trout shall be caught only from April 1 to August 15 inclusive; that may, be caught in all months but May. There is to be a limit of 100 fish per day, and a line in each fishing boat. The bill, however, when passing through the house, was permitted, except in the Kalamazoo river. Fishing in private lakes is forbidden, but notices must be posted up in prominent places about such lakes. Violators are to be punished by a \$200 fine or six months imprisonment, or both.
