Errors and Chants.

The First Telephone.

The Ghost.

Will hold up your forefinger about a

When you have made one disappear
in this way, move your head so
slightly backward, and the paper
will instantly reappear. The
reason of this is that every person's
eye has a blind spot in the retina,
and when an image of the paper
falls on the spot it cannot be seen.

Physicians use this principle in
the correction of vision.

Take a piece of background, a
piece of colored paper in any design,
and look steadily at it for a minute or
so. Then cover the colored paper with
the right eye, and a different one
in the left eye. The result will be

Instead of scratching the paper
away after looking at it steadily, look
up at the ceiling, and the image will
