How to Save the Trees.

Many of the trees, especially apple, peach, plum, and pear in Michigan have been blighted by such an extent that all of the smaller branches have been killed. The trunk and larger branches are still vigorous and are sending up strong healthy shoots.

If the dead portions are cut away and the remainder of the tree sprayed with lime, we are certain about the future of the tree.

At the time the young shoots have appeared and can be easily identified by the use of commercial lime-sulphur solution at the rate of one part to 30 of water. Whoever possible to spray the trunks and larger branches with a strong solution, 1-12, without getting it upon the leaves or new growth, this should be done.

In the case of trees that have the application to the new shoots should not be stronger than 1-30, but should be 1-12.

If the trees are blighted in this way, the injury from the scale may prove a blight as the scale can be easily controlled and if the trees are cut back a new shoot will be formed which will practically remove the blight.

Those who have trees apparently dying should have them sprayed to send specimens of them to the state for examination. The state should be advised of what is to be done.


