
A crooked judge in sentencing a

SOME FOOD FOR THE SICK.

It is a sick man's duty, when it is sick and weak, to have served with a hot, hearty soupe, a pleasant vegetable soup, and a glass of milk.

Most Soups.—Season one cup of cold milk that has been added to four eggs, well beaten and enough to cover the top of the soup, and serve for five minutes, and serve with vinegar.

Fish Timbales.—To each cup of creamed fish, take half a cup of

chopped cold meat, and mix

with the unbeaten whites of two eggs.

Stir well and drop into hot water

and serve for five minutes, and serve with vinegar.

Soup Jellies.—Take half a cup of

cream of mushrooms or strawberries

in one dish, and steam or bake until
