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

Amendments to the Constitution.

Proposed amendments to section ten

of article one, article three, and article 12

of the constitution, will be submitted to

the electors at the election to be held on

Tuesday, Nov. 8, 1914.

The amendment to section ten of article

one, if adopted, will empower the state to

issue bonds for the construction and per-

manent improvement of the public

roads.

The amendment to article eight, by

adding a new section 156, if adopted,

will give counties by appropriate legis-

lation, the right to issue bonds for the

construction of roads and the develop-

ment and improvement of agricultural

lands.

The effect of the proposed amendment

to section 10 of article three, is to give

the state the right to make any regula-

tion or any member of the legislature while in attendance at

any session of the legislature, or com-

mercial travelers, the right to vote,

although absent from the township, ward

or state in which he resides.

The effect of the proposed amend-

ment to article 12, adding a new section,

to change certain legislative regula-

tions, is to provide a more liberal and

the system of internal management

of such organizations. It is designed

to provide for a direct method of control

of each association by the members

thereof. This amendment will be oppo-

sed by fraternal beneficiary society

members.
