After the Heavy Smoke Clouds Cleared Away


We found everything safe and sound except that a light veil of smoke had settled upon many of the fine upholstered pieces and all other goods exposed.



GERMAN OFFICER TELLS THRILLING TALE OF A SOLDIER'S EXPERIENCES

Describes Sharp Engagement in Streets of Suburb of Lille When the Germans Marched Suddenly into the Midst of a French Detachment—Discipline Triumphs in Moment of Panic—Spirit of Men Under Fire Calm, Determined.

Philadelphia Has a Great Family of Foundlings

HILOPHILIA, PA.—The city of Philadelphia is the official father and mother of thousands of children, public and private, in the city hall, according to the records of the department of public welfare, and the city is trying to be the best parent that an impersonal city government can be.

In addition to supervising the health, safety, and welfare of the city's citizens, the city also assumes the parental obligations of the many nameless little strangers that are each year found within its borders, and the city is expending the delinquent, and the child who for some other reason has been cut off from its parents are very numerous in the city.

There are well taken care of in the City of Love, and the great majority of the progeny of mothers that raise thousand children in nearly every factitious institution within the city limits. A social worker in touch with the records of the city's foundlings, who have been deprived of a home, training.


