

MICHIGAN OWNERS OF AUTOMOBILES

Are Greatly Favored With Mutual Insurance.



CZAR ABDIATES RUSSIAN THRONE; REVOLT SUCCEEDS

Dynasty of Romanoffs Ends—
Nation Now a Republic.

MONARCHY IS ABOLIISHED

Soldiers Aided Revolutionists in Overthrowing the Government—500 Persons Reported Slain During the Fighting at Petrograd.

Petrograd, March 19.—Czar Nicholas II has abdicated the throne of Russia, both for himself and the twelve-year-old son, Alexei, Grand Duke of Russia, his brother, his brother, who had been decided upon originally to be regent, also had abdicated.

This ends the dynasty of the Romanoffs.

Russia now is virtually a republic.

Monarchy is Abolished.

The executive committee of the duma issued a manifesto stating that the czar had abdicated in favor of his son, Alexei, for a period of twelve months by the committee of twelve. For the time being, it is stated, the monarchy has been abolished. Councils of nobility in fifteen provinces have endorsed the revolution.

The duma telegraphed the principal generals at the front to use their influence to induce Nicholas to sign the manifesto.

General Brusiloff, commander in chief of the army, telegraphed: "I have fulfilled my duty to my emperor and my country."

General S. R. Raskov, member of the supreme military council, replied: "I have carried out your request."

General T. Y. Rozhkov, president of the duma, telegraphed: "I am ready to be a general for the people."

General P. N. Drevin, telegraphed: "I am ready to be a general for the people."

General G. V. Kornilov, telegraphed: "I am ready to be a general for the people."

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
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AUTOMOBILE-AIRPLANE COMBINATION



HE BUILT FIRST SUBMARINE

Connecticut Man Acknowledged as Pioneer of Most Deadly Naval Weapon Yet Devised.

The first submarine boat ever built was invented and constructed by David Bushnell, who was born in Connecticut in 1740 and died in 1790. He graduated to 1775. While a student he experimented on the subject and the year following his graduation he designed and built a submarine torpedo boat which he called "The American Turtle." While the Revolutionary War was in progress he attempted to destroy a 500-ton British man-of-war in New York harbor but was prevented by an accident.

The feasibility of his plan which involved many of the principles of the fighting submarines now in use. General Washington, the general in command, was greatly interested in his experiments. Bushnell died in 1824. In 1881 Col. Henry L. Abbott, corps of engineers, U. S. A., published a history of the American Revolution in which he gave a detailed account for the "calm and benign" expression which he wears in the portrait.

For three days open battle raged in the streets of Petrograd. Strikes in factories and on street cars were called in sympathy with the revolution.

Wednesday the week's nightmare of revolution ended more suddenly than it had begun. Blanks were pulled from the guns and were unloaded, factories stopped, and banks closed.

The only evidence that a revolution had been fought and won was the sound of the new Hussar of a more modern character.
