CAREFULLY PLAN THE HORSE BARN

Structure Should Differ From All
Other Live Stock Farm Shelters.

AVOID FAULTY VENTILATION

Design Pictured Here Has Many Desirable Features—Special Attention Given Stable Floor, Carriage Shed and Granary.

The greatest return will be realized from the time spent in planning when the structures are especially designed for the purpose which are to serve. A horse barn should differ in several respects from any other building in the country. Considerations required in order that the horses may be kept in the best of health form the fundamental considerations in drawing up a design. See to this in the first place, in arranging the stable, in attending to the stable and needs of the horses.

The determination of size is an important consideration in designing the stable. The size of the stable depends largely upon the man in whose care the farmer is in the habit of keeping his horses. Some farmers have a large number of horses which they work hard and which are to be turned out to the yards and sheds to winter. Such farmers usually raise horses to sell and always have more than they need. Other farmers keep just the number of horses required when present.
