"The town of Mexico is cleaned all year. That is because there is no money to keep them open. Carranza says it is because he is afraid of the Spanish.

"I was waiting at the railway station in one little village one day for the train and got word while I was standing there that the train had been blown up.

"Some land in Mexico is worth as much as \$10 an acre, but there isn't much of it exchange hands right now. The population in the desert regions averages about one to the square mile.

"The Germans are the only nation that have any mining in Mexico, and we're alone. There are only about 1,000 Japanese."

HAVE PUT BAN ON THE CAMERA

In Mexico Andre Tridon Found It
Difficult to Get Any Pictures.

HE SAW RUINS EVERYWHERE.

Was Waiting at the Station to Take Train When He Got Word It Had Been Brought Up—Schools Were Closed—About 1,500 Japanese in Country.

"When I was in Mexico a few weeks ago," says Andre Tridon, Mexican war correspondent for the Independent, who is attending the Chautauqua, "I had a hard time getting any pictures of Mexican scenes and of Mexicans. They have put the ban on the camera."
