SOMETHING GREATLY NEEDED

A Plan to Teach Cripples How to Work Like Men With All Legs and Arms.

When the war is over there will be thousands of crippled men in the United States and already a movement has been made to provide a large sum of money to be used in helping to support them.

The establishment of a sort of national clearing house for cripples, where a man's particular ability may be studied and he may be fitted into the place in industry or business he is best qualified to fill, is proposed.

There are hundreds of cripples throughout the country who have succeeded despite their misfortunes and these have been listed and classified. The Red Cross Institute is preparing pamphlets from the personal histories of these men and it is planned that as future cripples come from hospitals they be given a list of men afflicted as they are who have "made good" with an account of how they did so. A man with his right arm off will not need of men lacking left arms or legs or sight, but of men who have lost right arms and yet "carried on."

The first two months after coming from the hospital is the crucial time for the cripple. It is then that he realizes the full burden of his affliction and it requires the greatest will power and determination not to give way to despair. Then if he has the money he is apt to become a victim of drink, or if he has none, go on the streets with hat in hand as a beggar. It is at this time that he needs most aid and nothing will so brace him as to learn the experiences of others

who were successful despite everything.

F. R. Bigler of Kansas City, who 30 years ago lost his left foot and right arm, has made good and is aiding other cripples. With a simple contrivance he has learned to do with one hand and one foot what men do with all members. He can shoot a gun, row a boat, operate a typewriter, and such common acts as lacing shoes, shaving and hand washing have been made simple for this one-armed man through his ingenuity. He does all the repair work about his home, wiring it, laying granite walks and handling a hammer and other tools.

It will require a large outlay of money and the erection of many institutions where crippled men may be cared for and taught how to do for themselves, but it must be done. There will be need of every hand to preserve the prosperity of this country of ours after the war is over. The United States will have great problems to solve then, so we had better begin at once to prepare for it.



GOUGING GROCERS CAN'T GET SUPPLIES

WHOLESALES AGREE TO RE-FUSE TO SELL TO DEALERS WHO "HOG" PRICES.

"CASH AND CARRY" PLAN COMING

Food Administrator Intends to Start System in State—Cuts Down Cost of Foods.

Lansing—Retail grocers who raise "hogging" prices for foodstuffs obtained through Michigan jobbing houses will be deprived of future purchases.

This is the gist of what occurred at Lansing—when George A. Prudden, federal food administrator, met with Michigan grocers, who came to ascertain what action was necessary to assist the plan of food conservation and price making.

It is proposed to start through Michigan a cash-and-carry system of purchases. Mr. Prudden has administrative control of the increased cost of food commodities when credit and delivery charges are added.

This plan is working well in other states and is expected to give a reasonable profit to the wholesaler and retailer and allows a customer to make purchases at a decided save.

NEW GYM AT CUSTER UNDERWAY

Soldiers Erecting \$25,000 Athletic Building at Custer.

Camp Custer, Battle Creek—Troop labor under supervision of officers who in civilian life were architects and structural engineers will erect the \$25,000 camp gymnasium.

The building will be located on the main esplanade, near division headquarters, known as the center of a group of buildings to be centered around the camp garrison. The camp library and theater, now are nearing completion.

Work on the building will commence immediately. The total sum, \$25,000, has been raised or pledged by responsible parties.

Everyone will be compelled to learn how to swim, tennis, basketball under the most competent instructors.

The gymnasium will be used within days after building is completed.

Use will be made of F. A. Rowles, civilian director, sent to Custer by Francis McNaughton, Linneman, camp com-

mandant, to make arrangements for the use of the new department.

The building will be the largest structure in the camp, 100 by 125 feet, with a high and a low stories of 112x250 feet.


