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STATE NEWS  
IN BRIEF

Monroe.—The Pennsylvania railroad has completed the building of a new 100-mile double track to between Carlton and Detroit, a distance of 30 miles. Work trains are now being run between those two points.

Saginaw.—That the state tax on dogs in Michigan is in violation of the state constitution, presented to the Saginaw County supervisors. The tax dog tax collected in the entire county was about \$2,500, and of this the city showed the greatest percent.

Battle Creek.—One man was killed and several slightly injured when a gas pipeline exploded in a street.

Ann Arbor.—The University of Michigan has enough coal to property heat its buildings until the first of next year, it was announced.

Pontiac.—Beta Phi Sigma fraternal club's house at Walled Lake, one of the largest on the west shore of the resort, burned, causing \$10,000 damage.

Marquette.—Marquette County will expand \$16,000 in 1923 for the construction of good roads. Of this amount \$10,000 will be invested in new roads.

Battle Creek.—Brigadier General George W. H. Moseley of Camp Custer, is in command of the Sixth Corps area pending retirement Nov. 30 of Major General Bell, Jr., now on leave of absence.

Grand Rapids.—William Oakman, 70, had an arm crushed when he became caught between an elevator and a shaft at the store of the Remington Arms Company, where he is a watchman.

Owosso.—Regulations proposed by a postal employee began taking effect in post offices, O. R. Reynolds, postmaster, said. He referred to the local postoffice offices. He has served at the post office for 12 years.

Pontiac.—Charles Cross, former sheriff, must pay \$500 to Walter S. Scharf, who was injured when he was arrested, one day later to the same extent, in Scharf's possession legally, the county board of supervisors has decided.

Port Huron.—The railroad bridges at Berry, Mich., on the Pere Marquette railroad, were held up for an hour by a special train which was President Frank Alfred of the club, mounted National Guard organization of the state constabulary and all individuals interested.

Port Huron.—The Port Huron city commission has passed an ordinance making it an offense for "barkers" and solicitors to buy or sell houses or land, or to do business in the city. This is received as a death blow to several local men.

Monroe.—Arraigned before Lee Smith, judge of the 10th Circuit Court, was 25-year-old stock boy, the negro of having killed his wife, Myrtle May Bryan. He was bound over to the November term of the Circuit court with a \$10,000 bail.

Franklin.—Grant Haven, manager of the Grant Haven, a company of veterans, was recognized with "veteran of war" award at work and the first craft to be sent from the way was the "Franklin" built for the Johnsons.


