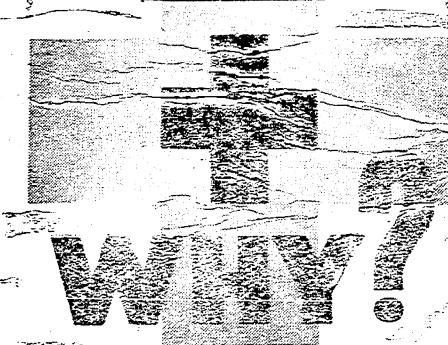

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Washington Merry-Go-Round

ERA OF FANTASY—It is difficult for the average person to understand the amazing things opened up by science during World War II, and realize that the unbelievable era of Black Rogers fantasy is now actually here. The most obvious development was the atomic bomb. Not as well known but perhaps even more fantastic are the numerous secrets of the earth which the bomb's invention also opened. For the past three years, for instance, geologists have been working on a project for setting off a controlled chain reaction in the crust of the earth.

This project is described by scientists as a hydrogen chain reaction, in which the hydrogen in the surface of the earth would be made to burn in a slow, continuous stream. Simultaneously, these scientists are reported to be preparing a means for speedily extinguishing such blazes.

Fantastic as this may sound, it is only a small phase of the field which science opened up at a time when the government, in desperation and out of fear of what enemy scientists might be doing, gave American scientists full freedom to work.

An earth-quake chain reaction now is deemed a reasonable possibility and might mean the end for a country even as large as Russia. A chain reaction of this type could carry across mountains, through ice and snow, setting up factors in the earth with the relentless force of a giant, freewheeling steam roller.

American scientists were told that what they are working on also is being worked on by scientists all over the world. No nation has a monopoly on knowledge. What American science has is a head start and the "know-how."

Several Republican congressmen came to the secret committee session primed with questions on Palestine and Russia. However, Marshall, with one eye on the clock, gave a brilliant monologue on foreign affairs for more than an hour.

Marshall's monologue, however, gave a well-timed picture of U. S. foreign policy. Here are the highlights:

RUSSIA—The Byrnes policy of being fair but firm with Russia will be continued. Marshall has given this policy careful study and is convinced Byrnes was right.

AUSTRIA—Will be the first treaty to be taken up in Moscow, largely because it is "in the name of a liberated area."

GERMANY—Within three years the German people should become economically unified and self-sufficient, requiring no more loans or food from the U. S.

PALESTINE—The United States must be more cautious regarding Palestine now that Britain has agreed to lay this problem of the United Nations. Instead of giving advice regarding Palestine, the U. S. A. now will have to act.

EUROPEAN RELIEF—Food continues to be the greatest stabilizing influence in the world, and the United States must continue to feed the world—perhaps for some years to come.

CHINA—"I am somewhat distressed about the Chinese situation," Marshall commented. He spent more time on this subject than on any other, remarking with a laugh that he felt more at home when talking about China. His office-record discussion of the Chinese situation was the longest in the history of the White House, but he had not already stated publicly.

MERRY GO-ROUND—Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt and son, James, have signed contracts to help in the scripting and give technical advice for a screen biography of the President. Producers will be Kennedy-Bushman productions, Alfred Dulles and his brother, John Foster Dulles, of the New York law firm of Sullivan and Cromwell, have been retained by Eric Johnston's Motion Picture Association as advisers for the General International Trade conference in April.

Pilots Blamed in Half Air Crashes

Not a Single War Flier Was Involved in Accidents.

WASHINGTON—Pilots were blamed in about half of the commercial flying accidents last year, but the record fails to show any connection with the "hot" military plane jockey incident as scheduled airlines are concerned.

Air Transport Association, representing the certified air carriers, examined the histories of pilots in 14 serious crashes on their lines to see if war flying could have figured in the background.

The answer was that not a single flier had come up through the armed services. Only two had war records—one as an air transport command pilot and the other flying a military contract route for an airline and both had previously served in the armed forces.

The cause of accidents, 22 of which involved fatalities, was set out in analyses of 35 crashes, 22 of which were attributed to pilot error. The remaining 13 were attributed to mechanical failure, weather, or other factors.

Power plant failure was blamed in 10 accidents, including three fires in flight. There's no doubt in the minds of the aviation experts that the power plant failure was the most common cause of accidents.
