Executive committees of three of the four major farm organizations, meeting here recently, expressed "grave concern" over the price situation and adopted a resolution in which they "viewed the present inflationary price trends" with alarm and urged leaders in industry, again and urged leaders in industry, agri-culture, labor and government to "Join in a concerted effort to hait this dangerous trend."



Giant Pyramid Found In Far West China

SHANGHAL—Existence of a giant SHANGHAI—Existence of a giant pyramid in the remote mountains of Shensi province in western China was reported by Col. Maurice Sheahan, Far Eastern director for Trans World Airways.

From the air, Sheahan said, the pyramid seems to dwarf those of Egypt. He estimated its height as seen from the air at about 1,000 feet and its width at the base at about 1.500 feet.

1,500 feet.
The pyramid, Sheahan said, nestles against the foot of the rugged

nestles against the foot of the rugged Tsingling mountains, which tower to 10,000 feet.

He placed it about 40 miles southwest of Sian, capital of the Chinese Han dynasty in the third century B. C. There is a second pyramid in the area, Sheahan said, but it appears—small compared with the main one. The pyramid, Sheahan said, is at the far end of a long valley, in an inaccessible part. At the near end, he said, are hundreds of small butial mounds of all shapes and sizes. al mounds of all shapes and sizes. These can be seen, Sheahan said, from the main Chinese East-West Lumghai railroad in its western section.
Sheahan, of Ontario, Calif., has spent nine years in lesser known areas of western China. First he was



His insurance, health and similar benefits cannot be cut. He cannot be fired, but he can be laid off. The case was taken to the high court from Cincinnait by a veteran when eight years were lopped off his seniority in a collective bargaining contract signed more than a year after he went back to work for his pre-war employer.

Manufacturers of many other items needed in electric construction were unable to meet the demand. Critical shortages developed in poles and transformers and wire, so that with our most strenuous efforts the best that we could get delivered was 42 per cent less copper wire and 34 per cent fewer transformers than we had ordered.


