List Precautions On Scarlet Fever

A total of 3550 cases of Scarlet Fever have been reported in Michigan so far this year, 37 of them in the past week, according to the Michigan Department of Health. While this number does not constitute a threat of an epidemic it does indicate that there are many persons in the state who should have the latest information on regulations and care of the patient having the disease, according to Dr. F. S. Leeder, director of the Bureau of Disease Control.

Scarlet fever is a contagious disease which is serious because even the mildest case may be followed by heart, kidney, or ear complications. The disease is most common in children under 15 years of age and most serious in children under five years of age.

The first warning signals of scarlet fever are sore throat, vomiting, headache and fever. In two or three days a rash usually appears, first on the neck and chest and then on the rest of the body except the face. It looks like small bright red pinpoints. Rash may not appear in scarlet fever and the other symptoms may be so slight as to be scarcely noticeable. The child, in such cases, should be isolated and kept in bed because mild cases are just as communicable as severe ones.

Other children should not play with the patient's toys or books. Any objects he handled while he was coming down with scarlet fever should also carry the germs.

Restrictions. New state regulations continue to require that all cases of the disease be reported, but posting the house with a warning placard is at the discretion of the local health officer.

While the patient must be isolated for at least 14 days, no restrictions are placed on exposed persons, except those who handle milk products. Disinfection of all articles which may have come in contact with the patient, shall be carried on during the entire period of isolation. The sick room and its contents shall be thoroughly cleaned at the time of release from isolation.

The two appear to go together, however, and Elmer is looking for a catchy slogan like the highway safety line, "Don't mix gasoline and alcohol."
