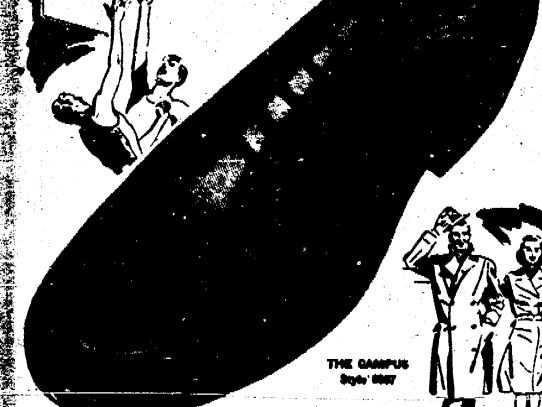

The topic, "New Ways of Controlling Household Pests," was presented by Mrs. Jean Wheeler and Miss Emma Kulenkamp.

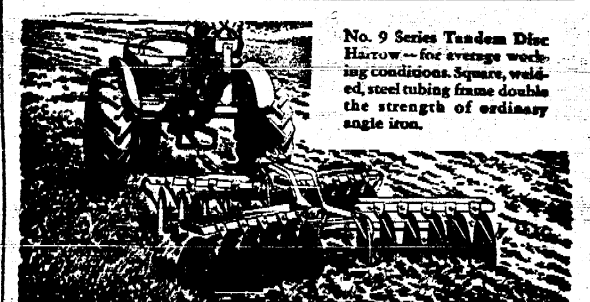
