Deer, hunters—and small game hunters who have put away their guns for the season—are reminded by the conservation department that it is now time to send in those game kill report cards.

A game kill report card is issued to each hunter and trapper as part of the hunting or trapping license. It must be separated from the license along a perforation, filled out and mailed with a one-cent stamp. It must be mailed sometime before February 15, but conservation department urges early mailing, so an early start may be made analyzing the reports through card punching and sorting machines.

When broken down by counties, the game production figures are of considerable local interest, and the "best" trends in the production of game, rabbits, squirrels, deer, and so forth are of considerable significance in drawing up the next season's dates and bag limits.

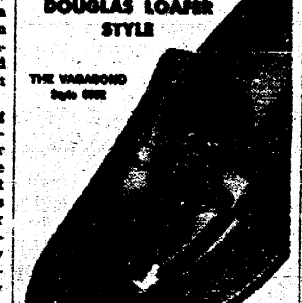
Shall America Follow?

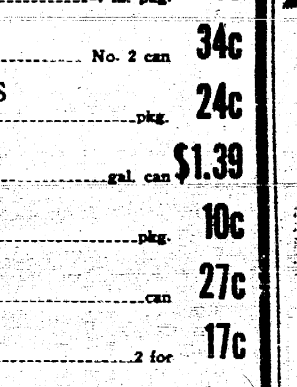
