
This is not the same as the corporation profits tax, which I have been urging . The franchise tax is based not upon the corporation's profits, but upon its net worth. Thus the franchise tax has to be paid whether the corporation makes any mon-

The crop is unusually large this year. In the two strawberry ccunties of Berrien and Van Buren, I'm told the acreage this year exceeds last year's total by some 3,000 acres. Weather conditions have been such that the crop has ripened fast, and it won't keep. Strawberry growers called on us for help, pointing out that they faced a surplus which might be disastrous to them.

We have obtained the aid of the Federal Production and Marketing administration which is launching a promotion and advertising campaingn throughout the Michigan fruit market area to increase the sale of Michigan strawberries. In addition, the State Department of Agriculture has set aside \$1,000 for emergency promotion work.



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
