
Proceeds from the dance will be used to provide more adequate outdoor lighting at the school. Everyone is urged to make the party a real success.

Richard P. Brannick

Richard P. Brannick, 71, a former resident of Manchester, died in a Detroit hospital Monday following a long illness.

Mr. Brannick was born in Manchester on December 18, 1881, a son of the late Patrick and Bridget Mooney Brannick.

He left Manchester about 50 years ago. Since that time he had made his home in Detroit.

Surviving him are two brothers, Edward and Thomas, both of Jackson.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Thursday, January 8, at St. Marys Catholic church in Manchester with Rev. F. Walter Homes officiating. Burial followed in St. Marys cemetery.

Third Man Is Badly Injured

Roy E. Sanders, 20, of 9635 Warner Rd., and Norman E. Brock of 230 S. Ann Arbor, Saline, were killed instantly in a three-car collision at the intersection of Warner road and Willis, at 7:45 Tuesday morning. Thomas E. Hufford, 22, of 9930 Stony Creek road, Augusta township, was seriously injured.

Brock died of a broken back and a skull fracture caused Sanders' death. Hufford is in University hospital suffering from a fractured hip, lacerations of the face and a possible skull fracture. The hospital reported his condition as being satisfactory Wednesday afternoon.

Apparently all three cars entered the intersection at about the same time. State Police believe that Sanders, who was headed north on Warner, struck Brock's car, which was headed east on Willis, causing Brock to glance off and head into a field where he struck a tree. Sanders was spinning around in the intersection when Hufford, who was headed west on Willis, plowed into him. All three cars were completely demolished and the occupants had to be pried out.

The police had to use an ax on Hufford's car before they could free him.

Brock is married and has two children. He has been employed at the Ypsilanti State Hospital since 1942, and he had just finished building a new home.

Both Sanders and Hufford worked at Universal Die in Saline. Hufford was headed toward work, and Sanders, who works the afternoon shift, was on his way to the Baptist Bible School in Detroit where he was studying to be a minister.

State Troopers Ted Niewiada and Glenn Foster of the Ypsilanti post, pulled the wreck and notified the next of kin.

WANTED: More polio nurses. Over and over during the course of last year's worst polio epidemic in history this phrase was repeated.

And over and over, thanks to funds made available through the March of Dimes, the call was answered.

"It was answered," said Mrs. Robert McNamara, county director of the March of Dimes campaign, "1,000 times. For that was the number of nurses who were recruited to help fight the record polio outbreak in Jackson."

"Most Crying Need" Mrs. McNamara said, "One of the most-urgent needs today is the need for more polio nurses."

"The pattern of polio in the last five years," she said, "has been epidemic in nature. It has come in waves, the summer months ahead, and it has been so bad that it has caused the deaths of thousands of children."

WHAT ABOUT OUR DEER? In the wake of our first "any deer" 3-day season a great deal of public sentiment was aroused protesting the apparent slaughter of an excessive number of animals. The reaction was fully anticipated by the Conservation Department which took a terrific verbal whipping from people and press on the heels of the close of the season. This writer joined the clamor, pleading the discretionary powers granted the Conservation Commission had been misdirected, and that the kill had been far too heavy in areas where winter starvation was no an important factor.

The Native Viewpoint We wept with the local population in the weeks that followed, and then as the days went by a strange thing happened. A lot of deer began to show in their old haunts in areas where our eyes had seen the herd "wiped out." Old timers

scratched their chins and wondered if the deer had come out of the ground. Calloused guides did a double-take when a fresh snowfall produced a myriad of tracks as the animals moved to and from their feeding grounds. It was a time for reconsideration. And this writer joined the die-hards who admitted things could be worse. There seemed to be a lot of deer left, almost everywhere. They would go into the winter with a better chance of survival, come what may in the way of weather. And this year's fawn crop should be a lot healthier—come next spring.

Total Kill of 142,000 Reported Our Conservation Department estimates the kill of all deer—buck, doe and fawn—at 142,000. This is far below the anticipated 200,000 which they tell us could have been killed without damaging the future of our picture looks a little brighter. Come next summer we'll probably see plenty of those bobbling white tails bounding across a field, and will turn to say, "Remember last November when we figured all the deer around here had been killed?" That's the way it will look in Michigan Outdoors!
