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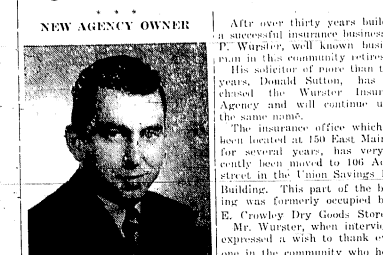
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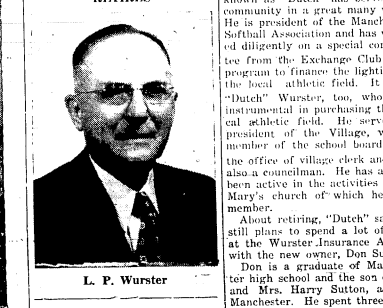

## Legion Zouaves To Star on TV and in Presidential Parade



The Michigan American Legion crack drill team, the Zouaves, from Jackson, were accorded national and local acclaim this week when it was announced they would appear on Ed Sullivan's national television show Sunday, January 18, and would represent the state of Michigan in behalf of the Republican party in the Presidential Inaugural parade January 20, Washington, D. C. The state Central Republican Committee chose the Zouaves for their brilliant, eye-catching parade maneuvers and also because their home town is Jackson, the birthplace of the National Republican party. Above the 21-man team scales a 14-foot wall to climax a 15-minute drill which is geared to 300 steps a minute. The team, all members of the Richard F. Smith Post 29, Jackson, is comprised mostly of World War II vets, but boasts four World War I members of which three are grandfathers. They are the only civilian drill team to perform for the cadets of West Point and a famed crowned heads of Europe.

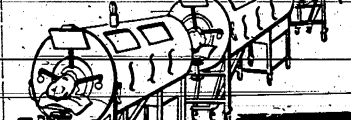

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## SAFETY COLORS FOR HUNTING

A new report has just been issued by the state of Pennsylvania after an exhaustive research of the best colors to wear for maximum hunting safety. This seemed a logical step because Pennsylvania's 850,000 hunters came up with 411 dead or injured by gunfire in the hunting field in 1951. The great majority of the casualties occurred because the shooter did not see the man who was to fall victim to his gun.

## Color Study Began

The question was simple: What could be done to make a hunter immediately recognizable against any background, or have him stand out so prominently that he could never be mistaken for game? The answer wasn't so simple. Red clothing had been recommended for years. But this was not enough. How much red? What shade of red? Does red still look red at long range, or in wet weather, or at all times of the year in foliage changing with the seasons? Would some other color offer better year-round protection?

A wide variety of colors and patterns of colors came into the study. All shades of reds, oranges, greens, yellows, black and white checks went under test. Included were those new daylight fluorescent colors

known as "Day-Glo" or "Coldfire." Hunters wearing caps and jackets of these colors were paraded in front of all kinds of natural backgrounds. Colored movies were made for continuing study. The results begin to look conclusive and may soon set a new trend in hunting apparel in all states.

## Fluorescent Colors Win

The daylight fluorescent colors, especially orange and red, were four times as bright as ordinary orange or red under poor light conditions.

Actually these colors appeared brighter than ever in deep shade such as might ordinarily be encountered in the hunting field.

The fluorescent colors maintained their identity at long range, contrasting sharply with all backgrounds. These colors are NOT simulated by any mammal or bird in our forests, and are therefore completely distinctive.

The day may come, and soon, when most states with any degree of hunter concentration may legislate in favor of this "Coldfire" apparel, both as an outside jacket, and a cap of the same material. Some of this type of cloth was used by Michigan hunters this year, and it was obviously the most effective color afield. Thus we're making strides toward greater safety for hunters in Michigan Outdoors.

## The SNAPSHOT GUILD



New fallen snow, changing the shape of familiar things, the bare trees, turn a drab winter landscape into a paradise.

## Let It Snow

YOU'RE probably familiar with the song which is revived every winter on the disc-jockey shows that choruses "Let it snow, let it snow, let it snow."

That might well be the theme song of camera enthusiasts this time of year because snow brings such wonderful views for them to focus on. So, whether you find snow in your own back yard or travel to chiller climes for a winter vacation, be sure that your camera gets out in the snow with you.

It's easy to get interesting pictorial effects with snow on the landscape. Furthermore, snow glamorizes scenes that would otherwise not be worth a glance into your view finder. Try doing your shooting early in the morning, or late in the afternoon. At those times the light is "low" and will provide you with long shadows that will add to the beauty of your picture.

Remember, especially if you are shooting in color, that the snow serves as a natural reflector of light and makes your subject a bright one. If you are using an adjustable camera, determine your

exposure with that in mind. If you have a fixed focus or box type camera, use ordinary snapshot film for your black-and-white shooting in preference to the faster, prismatic types. This film has sufficient exposure latitude to make up for the extra brilliance of your subject.

To determine exposure simply follow the instructions that are packed with the film, you are using. In the chart you'll find listed brilliant subjects and that's where you'll find the answer. A bright, sunny clear day is the best you can find for snow pictures. And, on such a day, with either black-and-white or color film, stand so the scene and the snow are lighted from the side. That is, rather than having the sun directly at your back, shoot with it coming from one side or the other. This will help you record faithfully the texture of the snow. The bright sunlight makes the snow sparkle, but don't forget that you can make very effective "mood" pictures on dull days. You probably won't want an album filled with that, but on an occasional one side variety.

Professor George Trout, since 1928, has long been prominent in the field of dairy products, their inspection and improvement.

In 1945 he earned the Borden Dairy Manufacturing Award the American Dairy Science Association. Prior to his appointment at MSC he held positions as instructor and assistant professor at the University of W. Va. He has also served as acting head of the MSC Dairy Department for several years.

Professor Trout earned his B.S. at Iowa State in 1923 and his masters degree there in 1924. He received his Ph. D. from Cornell University in 1926. Besides his academic work he has spent much time in research and writing. He has published more than 100 articles, bulletins and books covering the production, testing and judging of dairy products.
