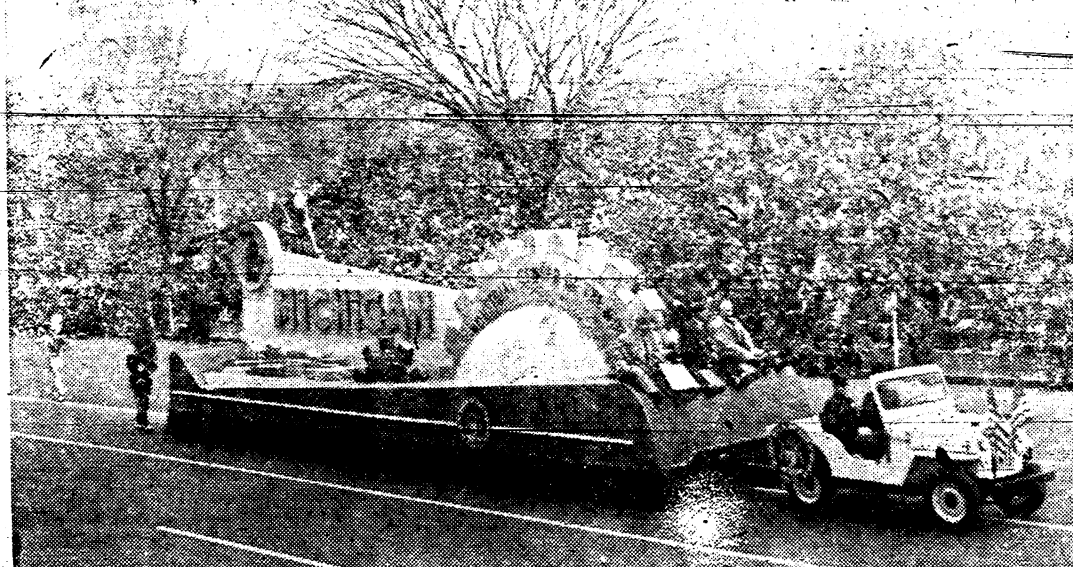

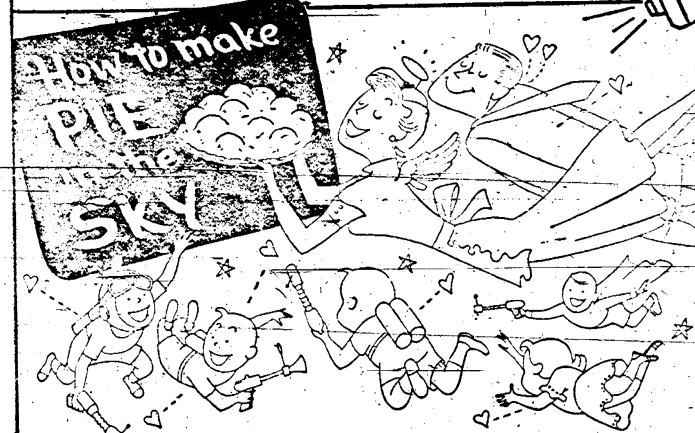


## MICHIGAN ON PARADE

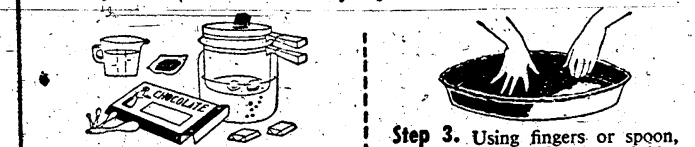

## Lynn Voegeding Writes From Rome

A letter from Lynn Voegeding, who spent Christmas in Rome, Italy, says that the city was very beautiful and that the people were very friendly.

The trip was a very interesting one and we were very close to the sea. After eating supper and being given a hotel room we were free to go where we wanted.

We walked around the shopping district for a while and then took a cab to St. Peter's Cathedral hoping to see the midnight mass. But when we got there, we found that there wouldn't be any this year. So we went back and went into one of the smaller churches (one of 451 churches in the city). It was a Catholic church and very pretty inside. We stayed about 15 minutes and it was crowded and we wanted to get some sleep. We were in four churches.

We got up the next morning—Christmas Eve, and had breakfast and then behind a bus for a tour of the city. For this we had a special guide from Rome. We saw several statues, fountains and etc. Then we went to St. Peter's in Vatican City. This is the big Cathedral you hear so much about. It's really a beautiful and huge on the inside. It's impossible to describe it. It's 30 feet high in the highest place of the dome and 800 feet wide at the widest place. The only light in the main part of the church is candlelight. The candles are held in big cut glass chandeliers which hang from the ceiling about six or eight, one above the other. The whole inside is made of marble and very elaborate with hundreds of paintings, statues and several altars. I am sending you a picture. The picture is a poor one as far as showing the beauty of the church, but it will show you some of the things I saw. In the afternoon we saw some of the ancient Roman walls which are in pretty good shape. Also we went through the North and South Gate to the city. We then took a ride down the Appian Way to the tombs which were closed on

Christmas. We then saw a big memorial tomb for 229 Italians who were held hostage during the last war and killed by the Germans. We went out and saw the catacombs. They're below the ground about 30 ft. and is the place where Christians buried their dead centuries ago. Before ending the tour, we visited the ancient remains of the Colosseum. There is one small section of seats left inside. Otherwise all that is left is the supports for the seats and of course, the outer wall.

During the time we also visited one of the famous seven hills of Rome. We visited a museum which is filled with statues of famous Romans and made by famous sculptors. We had dinner on the 20th about 1:30 and then left for London again.

We arrived back in camp at 10:30 a. m. Then I had to make up three morning reports and got done about 1:30 a. m. But it was worth it to see Rome. The city is not very comfortable because of the old buildings of cement and marble—which are dull and rather

shabby looking on the outside but very interesting.

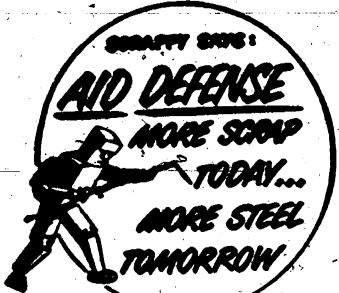

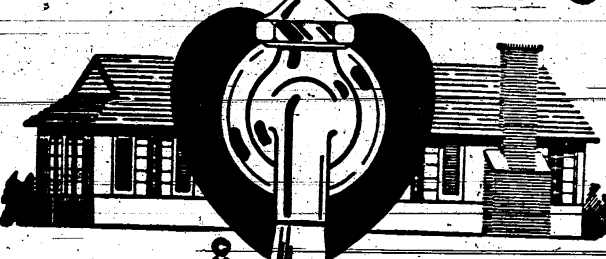

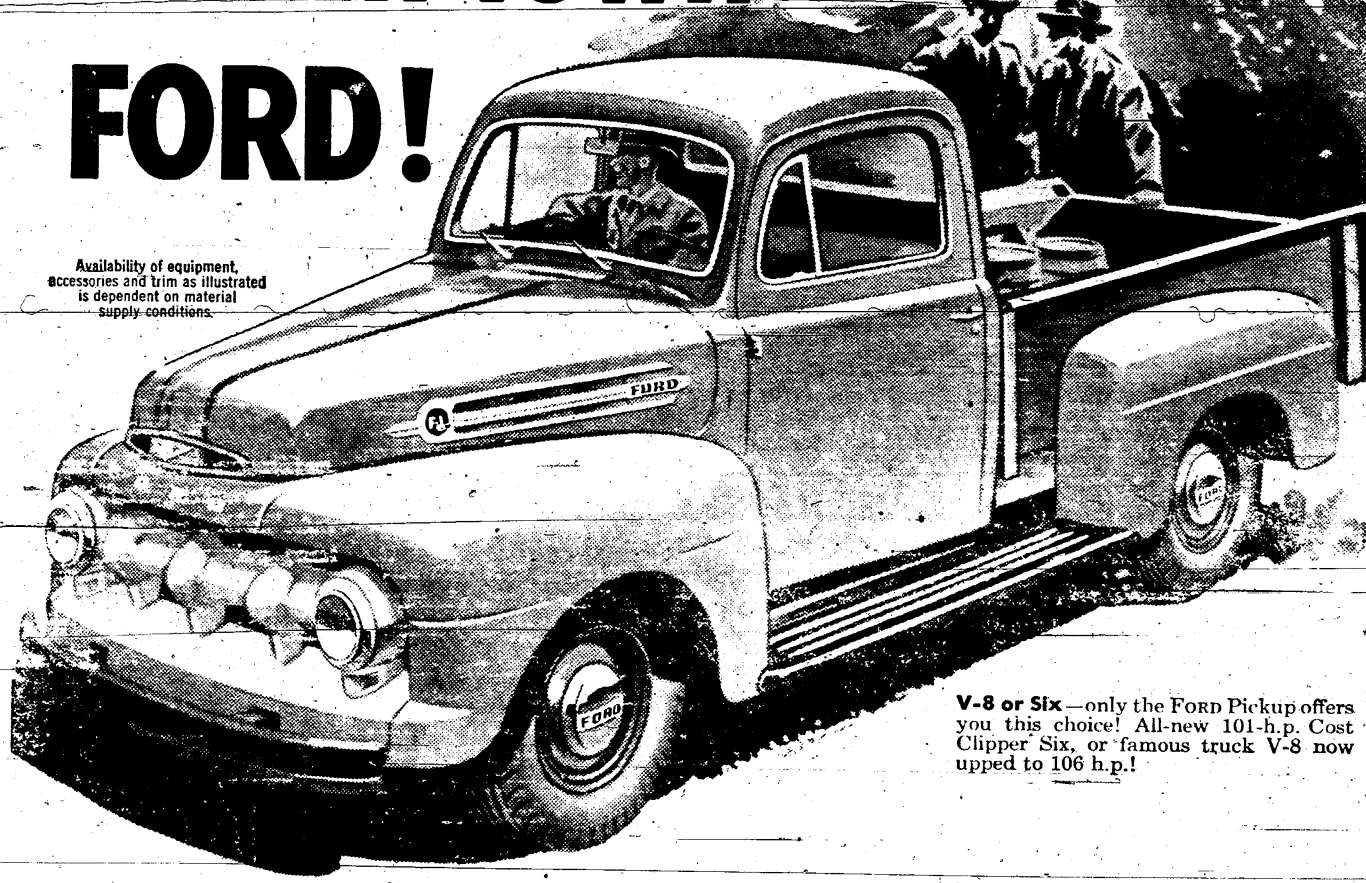
