These representatives have met with the approval of the village council. According to the committee it is hoped that other organizations other than those listed above will become interested and assist in the work of improving the grounds. Donations of equipment or money will be accepted from organizations or individuals for the improving of the park.

## Rev. Bergman Pastor At Methodist Church

The new minister of the Manchester Methodist Church, Rev. Adolf Bergman, comes to Manchester from the Carleton Methodist circuit he served for 3 years. He was born in Russia some 50 years ago, but is of Latvian nationality and is a citizen of the U.S. since last November. Most of his education he got in Russia and the Baltic states where he graduated from the University of Riga, Latvia, in 1926 with his Master of Arts degree; he studied theology in Frankfurt Main, Germany in 1922-23 and was appointed to his first church by Bishop Neusen in 1926. That year he married Miss Irma Valdmann of Riga, Latvia. They had one son, George, now married and residing in Ann Arbor. Mrs. Bergman was killed in a car accident June 23, 1952.

Rev. Bergman speaks 7 languages and has been in the Methodist ministry for more than 27 years and has served the church as pastor, youth and children's worker, social worker, superintendent, assistant interpreter to the bishop, delegate to the General Conference, Unit-

## Townships Give Funds For Roads

The Washtenaw County road commission township matching program for highway maintenance is well under way with all townships subscribed and projects completed in some.

Under the program the commission sets aside \$40,000 for the projects which include graveling, black-topping, bridge repairing, grading improvements, culvert rebuilding and other miscellaneous jobs.

M-11 just east of Main Street bridge is no exception to the rule as the Ann Arbor Construction Company has begun to remove the black-topping (which has become pretty bumpy and very much patched) and it is expected that a new black-top job will be completed in the near future.

Postmaster George Merriman has completed an inspection of the new rural mail routes in this area and it was discovered that about 25% of the Rural Mail Boxes did not have names of patrons inscribed on them as is required by post office regulations. It is important, Postmaster Merriman pointed out, that this requirement be met as in the event of a substitute carrier servicing the route, it is difficult for him to deliver the mail correctly and sometimes results in delay or non-delivery of mail. He asks that everyone inspect carefully with this respect the placement of their names on the front of the mail box if it is equipped with one of the new type of mail boxes.

The Manchester townships have been heard much of late of Indian times. Peter Kensler brought on Indian costumes to the library where a display. That number is "3111." It is the suggestion of chief Scheid that we take a piece of adhesive tape and stick it on the base of the phone

Roger Pratt, fifteen-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. James Pratt is still a patient at the Tecumseh Herick Memorial Hospital where he was taken three weeks ago with a brain concussion received when the pick-up truck in which he was riding left the road and tipped over. James Boch, aged, thirteen years, driver of the vehicle at the time of the accident was uninjured. Another passenger, Kenneth Pniwski was treated at the Tecumseh Hospital and was released.

Both Mr. Dresselhouse and Mr. Haab are suffering from second and third degree burns about the face, arms and chest.

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### Notice to Washtenaw County Farmers

Farmers in Washtenaw County are urged to be on the alert for army worms. It was reported on Tuesday, June 23, that army worm flies are numerous in the southern part of Michigan. These flies will lay eggs which hatch into the larvae known as army worms. A severe infestation can completely destroy a grain or hay crop within one day.

There are three recommended methods of control: spraying, dusting, and baiting. Sprays or dusts may be used on grain where the straw is used for bedding. The sprays or dusts are as follows:

1. Toxaphene SPRAY: 1 and one-half pound per acre; DDT: 2 and one half pound per acre.

2. Chlor-dane SPRAY: 1 pound per acre; DDT: 1 and one-half pound per acre.

3. DDT SPRAY: 1 and one-half pound per acre; DDT: 2 pounds per acre.

These amounts are of actual chemical, meaning the poison exclusive of any diluent or filler. Illustration: There is 1 and one-half pounds of actual pounds of DDT chemical in 3 pounds of 50% wettable DDT powder. Use 5% combinations. When 12 horses go and one half of Toxaphene.

Do not use the above sprays or dusts on grain known for feed. Bait should be used in pasture and hay crops. Bait can be used up to the same day.

Bait No. 1  
 Chlor-dane 25 lb.  
 Bran 25 lb.  
 Sawdust 75 lb.  
 Water 5-7 1/2 gal.  
 Mix sawdust and bran together. Put chlor-dane in water before using water to moisten bait. Stir chlor-dane-water mixture well.

Bait No. 2  
 Toxaphene 1 lb.  
 Bran 25 lb.  
 Sawdust 75 lb.  
 Water 5-7 1/2 gal.  
 Mix sawdust and bran together. Put Toxaphene into water before using water to moisten bait. Stir Toxaphene-water mixture well. Use 20 pounds of bait per acre applied in the evening since army worms feed at night.

### NUMEROLOGY

### New Insecticide

#### To Fight Army Worms

Introduction of a powerful new weapon into the battle against the armyworms destroying corn and grain crops in the Midwest raised hopes today that the current rampage of the insect horde can be stopped dead.

New hope for farmers in the path of destruction follows granting of official label acceptance by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for use of dieldrin against armyworms. Dieldrin is recognized as one of the most effective weapons available.

The areas hit by armyworms are receiving rush shipments of dieldrin, versatile agricultural insecticide already widely in use against other crop pests.

Long a plague feared by farmers across the nation, armyworms are at present causing widespread losses in Illinois, Indiana, and Ohio following outbreaks in the southern states. Some entomologists have reported that the current outbreak is the worst in more than fifty years.

The destructive pests have been appearing in more and more areas as the season advances. Farmers have been advised to examine as the season advances. Farmers their fields daily for their presence.

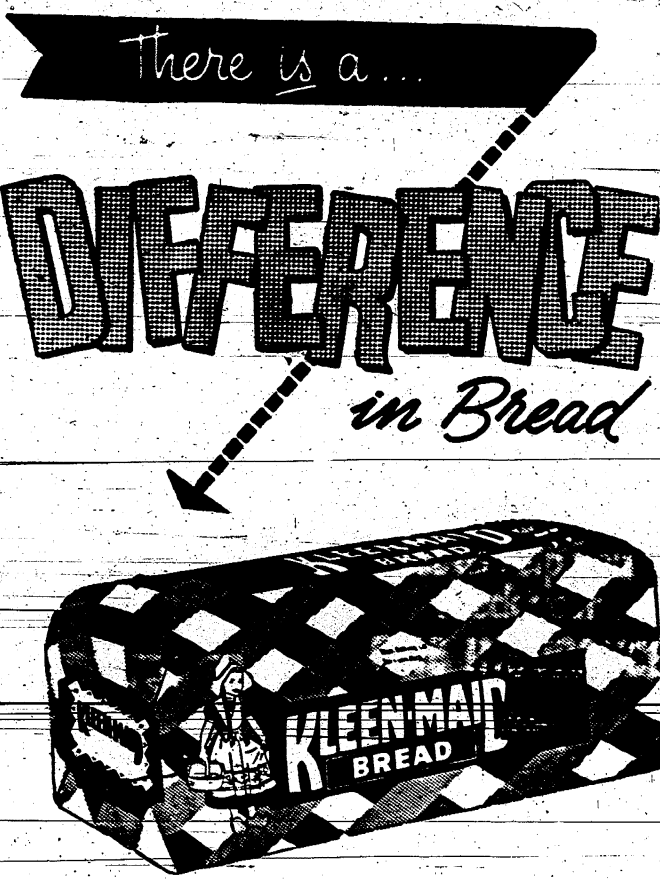
The Department of Agriculture previously has accepted labels for the use of dieldrin against many agricultural pests, such as plum curculion, onion thrips, and chinch bugs. The technical name "dieldrin" was developed and is manufactured by a Shell Chemical Corporation subsidiary, Julius Hyman & Company. It is blended and formulated by most of the leading manufacturers and distributors of insecticides throughout the United States.

In addition to killing armyworms and cutworms, the insecticide is highly effective in simultaneously controlling chinch bugs which also are attacking corn fields.

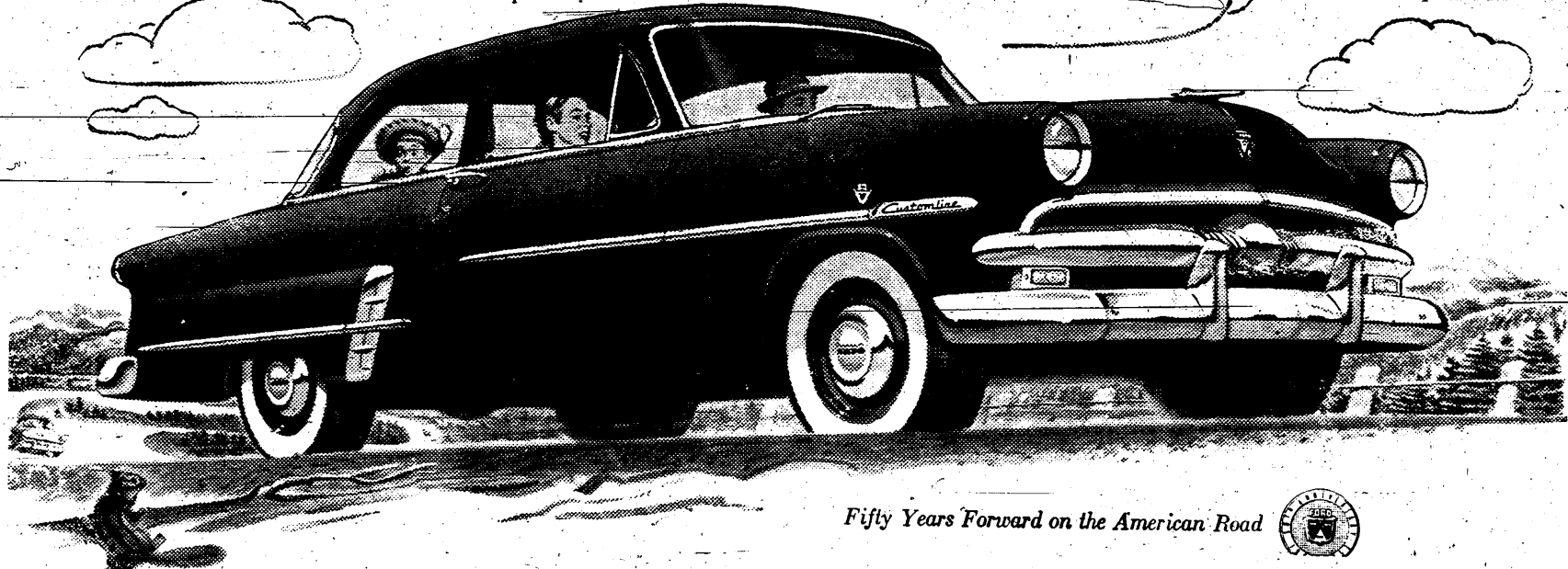

Be sure to clean granaries thoroughly and spray with methoxychlor or DDT before putting in this year's grain, cautions Donald R. Johnson, county agricultural agent.

Use methoxychlor where possible, he suggests, because there is less danger from poisonous residues on the grain. And, he advises, store all old grain in separate buildings or sell it. Storing new grain with old grain is one of the surest ways of helping granary insects increase in numbers and damage the grain.

Extension Entomologist Ray fore grain is stored. This usually

Janes of Michigan State College, says this is the recommended application: Use methoxychlor 50% wettable powder or DDT 50% wettable powder. Use two pounds of either material in five gallons of water when a broom is used to apply. One and a fourth pounds in three gallons of water when knapsack sprayers are used; 40 pounds to 100 gallons of water for power equipment. He maintains that thorough treatment of the floors, ceilings, and walls of bins is important.

Under no circumstances, he warns, should chlordane or lindane be used to treat granaries or grain bins.

He advised applying the methoxychlor or DDT two weeks before grain is stored. This usually

is enough time to reduce the insect numbers within the granary. A few days before storage of the grain, sweep the granary out thoroughly, removing the dead insects and all loose methoxychlor or DDT from the walls, ceilings and floors.

How well dairy farmers handle their hay in the next few days will determine their feeding costs next winter, says Donald R. Johnson County Agricultural Agent.

Experimenters at Michigan State College, he points out, show there is little difference in quality between silage and mow cured hay if the feed is handled properly. Field cured hay, if handled right, and the weather cooperates, is of equal quality, too, he says.

With good pasture and forage, he says, feed costs can be reduced to half the cost of feeding grain. It's the cheapest way of providing protein and other feed nutrients for dairy cows.

Maintaining good pasture, according to Murray, means extending the season after June. Alfalfa brome, the main pasture in Michigan, sometimes is in short supply and other grasses go dormant after June. He suggests using cover 1,000 square feet of lawn.

The M. S. C. specialist advises that the chemical should not be used on new seedlings of grass until the last part of July.

Some of the rescue grasses, especially chewings fescue, will whiten after the application but they will not die out. White clover will be defoliated but not harmed otherwise. It comes back quickly. The chemical does not affect the grasses like Kentucky bluegrass and bent grass, however.

Chlordane has other advantages too, Grigsby adds. It will eliminate ants from the lawn and it'll get rid of moles by killing the lawn grubs on which the moles feed.

and the first cutting of alfalfa brome has been put in the silo, part of it can be fed as a supplement.

Chlordane is the best thing on the market today for the control of crabgrass in your lawn, reminds Donald R. Johnson, county agricultural agent.

Johnson says it's much better than straight kerosene because oil base chlordane will wipe out the lawn pest with one application. Three applications are needed with kerosene.

B. H. Grigsby, Michigan State College plant physiologist, recommends applying the chlordane about July 1 on established lawns.

or the 40 per cent concentrate it takes one pint in a gallon of oil—a water-white grade of kerosene. If you use the 72 per cent concentrate only a half pint is needed per gallon of kerosene. Both will Balbo rye for early and late pasture and sudan grass, where adapted, for pasture after June if it's needed. And, he adds, Reed Canary grass can be sown in low places for pasture. It's palatable if fertilized and grazed heavily.

Special Savings by Eastern Railroad Presidents Conference

Specially reduced round-trip coach ticket bargains, scheduled to expire June 30, are being extended to Dec. 31, 1953. It has been announced by 15 Eastern railroads.

The two travel packages—known as "Family Plan" and "Group Economy Fares"—apply to round-trip coach fares between points that are more than 100 miles apart, with certain exceptions.

Under the "Family Plan," children under 12 ride free and those 12 and under 16 at half-fare, when accompanied by a parent paying the regular round-trip fare. Thus, the group shown in

top panel would buy only two and one-half fares, rather than three adult and two half-fares.

"Group Economy Fares" permit a 25 per cent reduction on round-trip tickets when three or more adults, or larger groups, travel together, as shown in the bottom panel.

According to Vanderbilt Armold, chairman of the Trunk Line Central Passenger Committee of the Eastern railroads, coach travel jumped when the railroads first announced their economy travel plans last year.

He said more people are taking more frequent and longer train trips now than ever before. He

also felt that ticket savings would prove the advantages of railroad travel to those who rarely or never take trips because they feel the cost is too high.

Eastern railroads offering the economy fares are the Baltimore and Ohio, the Central Railroad of New Jersey, the Chesapeake and Ohio, the Chicago, Indianapolis and Louisville, the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western, the Erie, the Grand Trunk, the Lehigh Valley, the New York Central, the Nickel Plate, the Norfolk and Western, the Pennsylvania, the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie, the Reading and the Wabash.

### Gold Star Camp To Open June 28

"More than 900 boys and girls whose fathers died on global battlefields in World War II and in the Korean War will be the guests this summer at a camp near Spooner, Wisconsin, sponsored by the Gold Star Wives Service Foundation." It was announced today by Madeline Clausen, Foundation President.

The Gold Star Wives Service Foundation, incorporated in the State of Illinois, May, 1951, conducts a program for the health, education, service and welfare for the mothers, fathers, widows, and children of deceased servicemen. It is a subsidiary of the Gold Star Wives of America, whose National Headquarters are located in Washington, D. C.

The 183-acre camp, located on Rooney Lake, will receive its first group of youngsters on the third anniversary of America's entrance into the Korean War, and will be dedicated to the memory of General Walton Harris Walker, U.S. Army, former Commanding General of the Eighth Army, who was killed in Korea December 23, 1950.

"Children between the ages of seven and fifteen whose fathers died in service are eligible to attend the Gold Star Camp with no cost whatsoever to mother or guardian," Mrs. Clausen pointed out.

The General's widow, Mrs. Carolyn Walker, of Washington, D. C., will be present at the dedicatory exercises, which will be held at the camp site at 3 p. m. Sunday, June 28. During the ceremonies Mrs. Walker will unveil a photographic portrait of the General which will be displayed in the Lodge.

### Fertilizers Aid Alfalfa In Summer

Start your August-September build-up of alfalfa fields now, as soon as your first cutting is harvested, advises Edward D. Longnecker, extension soil scientist at Michigan State College.

One principal cause of unsatisfactory alfalfa yields in Michigan is lack of readily-available plant food in the soil, he claims. The 1950 agricultural census showed the average Michigan alfalfa acre yielded only a ton and a half of hay. Yields of twice and three times that amount are not uncommon—where plant food is available.


This necessary plant food can be added to the soil any time during the growing season, Longnecker explains, but there is no better time than shortly after the first cutting. This provides for the important August-September buildup.

This fertilizer application right after first cutting should increase next year's yields more than nutrients put on in late summer, fall or early next spring, he notes.

Farmers should not try to place fertilizer in the soil on established stands, the M. S. C. soil scientist warns, because discs of the drill will injure plant crowns; this might be a factor in spreading bacterial wilt. He advises broadcasting the fertilizer over the surface.

On heavy clay soils, use 0-20-10 analysis fertilizer. Longnecker suggests. For light or sandy loam he prefers 0-20-20, and 0-10-20 or 0-10-30 are better adapted to light sands. Don't skimp on quantity, he adds. Plan on at least 200 pounds per acre per year of this fertilizer.

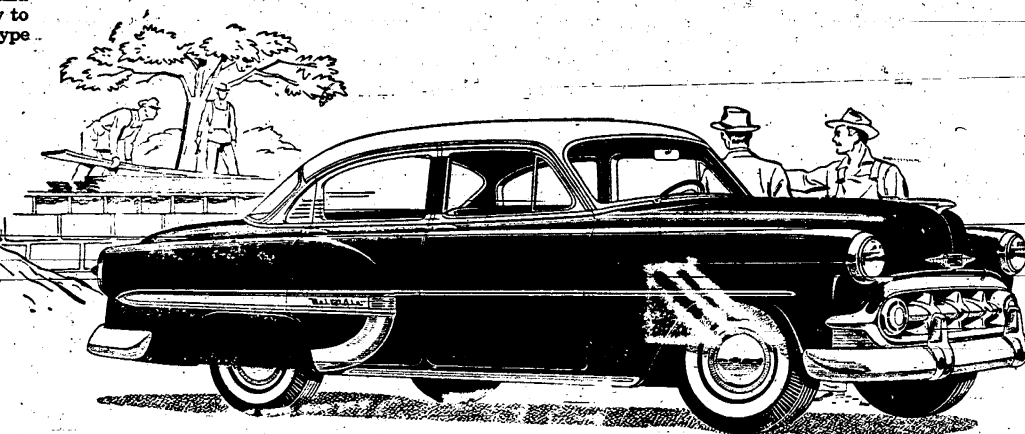

with the number clearly written on it. It is poor judgment to trust memory—because in case of

an emergency it is very likely to play tricks. If you prefer, take a piece of paper write "Fire or Police Phone 3111" and Scotch tape that number to your phone. This little suggestion—if heeded—may pay off in big dividends and may save dollars by saving minutes that would be wasted in looking up the number in the telephone book.

Chief Scheid also takes this opportunity to warn people that in the event of a fire in a closed room—use care in opening the door. If you must open it be careful and keep yourself from in front of that door—remember that in a closed room fire cannot gain the headway it can in an open one—fire must have oxygen to burn and often a smolder-

ing fire needs only to get fresh oxygen from the air for it to explode. Many deaths have resulted when people have attempted to gain admittance to a burning building—and on opening doors

have had the fire literally burst into their faces. Wisest of all—call the fire department PHONE 3111—the boys know how to handle these situations—let them do the job.

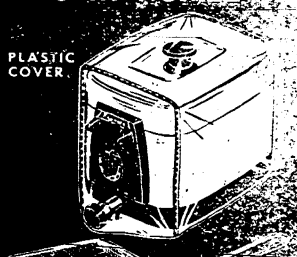
