Willard Mann, who is handling publicity for the fair, promises a story for next week's paper.


## Paul Finnegan Accepts Position In Wyoming

## Bridge Falls Under Truck; Driver Safe

A 32-year-old gasoline transport truck driver jumped to safety when his truck and trailer loaded with 8,800 gallons of gasoline crashed through the Wilbur road bridge and plunged into the Raisin River shortly after noon Friday, August 14. The Wilbur road bridge in Bridgewater township is located four and one-half miles south of Manchester and three and one-half miles north of Clinton.

The driver, Joseph Horgus, Jr., of Lincoln Park received only slight injuries as his cab wheels clung perilously to the west abutment of the bridge, and he jumped to safety. The second trailer of the outfit flipped on its side across the Raisin River. The first trailer remained cocked at an 80 degree angle on the west bank.

Horgus said he was bringing the load of gasoline from Toledo, Ohio, to Manchester's bulk station by way of the Clinton-Manchester road, using a diesel tractor with a semi and four wheeled tractor truck. The truck was owned by the L. A. Smith Company of River Rouge. Horgus has been driving for the company for the past five years.

He stopped the rig when he noticed that the Clinton-Manchester road over which he had been traveling, had been freshly black-topped. After talking to the paving crew and fearing he would damage the still soft black-top, unable to turn the vehicle around, he detoured to the west on Wilbur road and decided to proceed to Manchester by way of back routes.

His cab had barely cleared the west end of the 80-foot one way span when the bridge gave way beneath the load. The bridge over the secondary road was constructed of steel I-beams supporting a concrete deck. One of the gasoline tanks was punctured and gasoline poured into the river from holes. The Clinton Fire Department was called and fire chief John Schuler and twelve of the volunteer crew stood by while George Kulekowsky, Al Nunley, Johnny Woods, and Barney Hopp of the Detroit Towing Company pumped the remaining gasoline out. The Detroit outfit removed the trailers from the river on Saturday.

Washtenaw county road officials said the truck had no business off approved highways and indicated that legal action may be taken to recover damages to the bridge.

## Everett District Disbanded

The Manchester Board of Education and the Chelsea Board of Education met with the Washtenaw County School Board and Mr. Julius Haab, County School Superintendent, at the Court House at Ann Arbor Friday night on the disbanding of the Everett School District. About 33 per cent of the former district valuation will be consolidated with the Chelsea Rural Agricultural School and 67 per cent of the valuation will be annexed to the Manchester Public Schools.

At this meeting a hearing was set for August 31 to consider the annexation of five farms of the English District that have petitioned the Washtenaw County School Board for annexation to Manchester.

This action was the result of the petition of the individual property owners filed direct with the County Board of Education.

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

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## Legion Winds Up 35th Annual State Convention

tion wound up one of the most

productive business sessions on record Sunday, August 2, in Detroit and unanimously elected Billy R. Wickens of Midland, state commander for 1953-54.

In session at the same time in Detroit, delegates to the American Legion's Auxiliary chose Mrs. Fern McCauley, Wyandotte, over Mrs. Mary Jorgenson, Grayling, at their 33rd annual state convention, to hold the honored spot of president of 30,000 auxiliary members in Michigan.

Wickens, who was opposed by Kent Lundgren, Menominee drug-gist, received the acclaim of the 1,999 delegates representing 75,000 Legionnaires in Michigan, in one of the fastest elections in Legion history.

Among the more than 47 resolutions proposed for official expression, two proposed resolutions urging legislature to legalize charitable bingo games and raffles were beaten down by a majority of the convention's delegates because of "political implications."

## Prices of Lambs To Stay Up


A Michigan State College extension livestock marketing specialist predicts that lamb prices will continue through August and decline seasonally in early fall. Dan Stark suggests that sheep men "finish out" spring lambs to arrive at markets in August before prices drop.

He warns that the pressure of a heavy run of grass-fed cattle this summer and early fall and an early marketing of hogs could

press lamb prices lower than the normal seasonal decline. Lower prices for young breeding stock now, adds Stark, should interest farmers in replacement stock.

## Coliseum Reserved For Livestock Judging

The 1953 Michigan State Fair has its Coliseum reserved for livestock judging and events in a repetition of the policy established last year.

James M. Hare, General Manager, announces the dates will be Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, September 8, 9, and 10. This will come in the middle of the ten day State Fair which opens September 4 and closes September 13.

The Board of Managers was elated by the success of last year's emphasis on livestock and farm judging and events in the Coliseum which meant the ousting of theatrical entertainment for the three days and nights. Thousands of spectators, many of them city

dwellers who became acquainted with the events for the first time witnessed last year's programs.

This year's program will be more extensive with John Merrifield, WWJ Farm Editor, presiding as master of ceremonies and announcer of judging, and other results.

Judging events will be interspersed with entertainment such as the famous border collies exhibitions, the Detroit Mounted Police Drills, Square Dance Quadrilles and music.

A sheep shearing demonstration will be held Tuesday evening, and the horse pulling finals will be held Wednesday and Thursday evenings. Other evening events include judging of Morgan, Arabian, Western and English Pleasure Classes, Four Horse Hitches and Dressage Acts.

### Don't Mix Old Layers With Young Pullets

Your pullet flock will be a lot safer from disease if you sell off the old layers in the fall, says a poultry specialist at Michigan State College. Mixed flocks of old and young chickens have a higher incidence of avian tuberculosis than those with only young pullets.

Selling the older hens before taking pullets off range gives the poultryman a chance to clean the laying house thoroughly, too, says M. S. C.'s Charles Sheppard. When you clean up an empty house there is a better chance of destroying parasites and disease organisms.

After cleaning the house thoroughly, Sheppard recommends a strong lye solution—one pound of lye to 10 or 15 gallons of water for scrubbing the interior. He also advises a creosote disinfectant sprayed on the side walls and roosts, forced into cracks and crevices. Be sure to use rubber footwear and rubber gloves when you are working with creosote and lye, he cautions.

The American Legion Zouaves of Jackson, who have performed in London, Rome and Paris, once again will highlight the special Veterans' Day program on September 12 at the Michigan State Fair.

The Zouaves originated after World War I and were organized by Colonel Sparks of Jackson. They are returning by popular demand, presenting unusual exhibitions of foot drills and wall scaling.

Appearing for the first time will be the United States Air Force Band and many other outstanding band units from both the United States and Canada.

The Spanish-American War Veterans will send their Fife and Drum Corp for an appearance drill.

As usual, all veterans with proper credentials will be admitted free to the State Fair on Veterans' Day. The Fair opens on September 4 and continues through September 13.


The proclamation issued by Governor Williams on August 5, 1952 prohibiting the movement of swine into Michigan unless accompanied by a health certificate has been rescinded as of August 6, 1953.

The proclamation was issued to assist in the control of Vesicular Exanthema in swine.

On July 1, 1953, a Federal regulation went into effect which effectively governs the interstate movement of hogs from garbage feeding premises. The Federal regulation affords ample protection to Michigan swine, according to Dr. Lee Davisson, State Veterinarian.

Hogs coming into Michigan, except those going to immediate slaughter, or to a slaughter house approved by the Michigan Department of Agriculture, must be accompanied by a permit issued by the Department, or a health certificate issued by proper authorities in the state of origin.

### Record Freshman Class At U-M In Fall


Another record-breaking freshman class will be among the 17,500 students expected on the campus of the University of Michigan when the Fall Semester opens on September 21.





### Bad Check Artist Working In County DeVine Warns

A sharp increase in the number of fraudulent check crimes brought a warning to Washtenaw merchants to be wary of strangers attempting to cash checks.

The word of caution comes from Prosecutor Edmund F. DeVine, who stated that the bad check problem is definitely on the rise here as well as throughout the country.

DeVine advises businessmen to ask questions if someone they don't know tries to cash a check merchant began asking questions. "On many occasions when the would-be check cashers have walked away without going

through with the transaction," he said. Washtenaw has a number of cases being investigated now in which the check passers "just can't be found," he noted. The prosecutor added that the last several extradition cases in the county have involved bad checks.

Writing checks without funds is "more or less a transient crime," DeVine said, "and presents very little risk. The passer gets the same results as if he robbed with a gun."


