


A Rude Awakening

Predict 30,000 Students At MSC By 1970

The campus proper of Michigan State College, excluding the hundreds of acres in experimental farms, will grow 30 1/2 per cent in the next 15 years, a college department head told a landscape architects conference at Michigan State on Thursday.

"It appears entirely likely," said Dr. Harold W. Lautner, of the Department of Landscape Architecture and Urban Planning, "that the campus proper will grow from its present 540 acres to 900 acres to serve the predicted 1970 enrollment of 30,000 students."

The original overall campus of 675 acres in 1955 has grown in the 100 years to more than 3,700 acres now. The campus now, said Mr. Lautner, includes more than 100 permanent buildings, 500 temporary structures, 12,000 trees, 40 miles of walkways and 16 miles of roadways to serve its 15,000 students.

In his forecast of M.S.C. campus growth, Dr. Lautner, explaining that 18 new school buildings are proposed in the five-year expansion program initiated recently by the state legislature.

During the past nine years, M.S.C. has spent \$50 million in facilities to serve the current enrollment of 15,000 students.

The conference of landscape gardeners, meeting at Kellogg Center, heard Dr. Lautner declare that a great university campus such as M.S.C. with a heritage of spaciousness, luxuriant plant growth and open space is a test in community planning and in the architecture of its landscape.


