Bad check passers are increasing in Michigan, bringing a warning from State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs to "treat everybody as a stranger."

An increase of 21 per cent in the number of fraudulent checks processed by the state police during the first four months of 1959 and a 40 per cent increase during May has been feported. Detective Sgt. Fred C. Kelly, head of the fraudulent check detail at state police headquarters, said the increase probably is due to bettering economic conditions.

He explained that, contrary to popular belief, bad check passers more often succeed when the economy is healthy, when there is a general feeling that most people have money to back them up. Kelly's records show that July and August are the months at the height of the tourist and vacation season when most small merchants become the victims of check passers.




