

"Farmers can take the top 23 inches from about 25 plants, let them dry naturally and ship them to the University soils testing laboratory at East Lansing, for the analysis," according to Ray Cook, head of the soil science department. The analysis services costs \$2.

Boron deficiencies are spotty in Michigan, Cook says. "But they generally show up on soils that are alkaline or only slightly acid," he explains.

Tiles In Place
Tile drains in sandy and organic soils present two big problems — keeping the unstable soils out and holding tile firmly in place, according to Willard A. Cutler, agricultural engineer at MSU. Several plastic and glass fiber materials can help keep drains in place in the shifting fine soils. drains in place in the shifting fine soils.

"Thin sheets of vinyl plastic and duramat can keep tile from getting out of line or tipping on end." Cutier explains. "Some plastic sheets are only two one hundredths of an inch thick. Duramat is a glass fiber material impregnated with bituminous cement."

Tilers place a continuous plastic sheet in the ground, and then lay the tile on top of it, Cutler says. "The material is water tight and will keep sand from entering the tile at the bottom of tile joints."

Cutier recommends glass mats cutter recommends glass mats to keep fine soil out and let water in. "Otherwise," he explains, "tile drains may fill up and then they become almost useless."

The engineer says glass mats in a swirl-reinforcing pattern keep out soil beside and above the tile. The glass mat is laid over the top of the tile. Mats are also available in a parallel-reinforcing pattern.

"You may need to use both the stabilizing material and a fiber filtering mat in muck fields or in fine sandy soils," says Cutler.

"Most drainage contractors have information about these new materials," the engineer notes.
