How To Buy Meat

Nothing terrifies the inexper enced housewife more than s lecting meats. If you know not

iecting meats. It you know noting about purchasing meat, a good butcher is your best friend and instructor. Don't pretend to know, when you don't know. Tell the butcher what you have in mind and take his advice.

If you shop where meut is prepackaged, these basic facts may help you: Animals dressed for market are divided lengthwise through the backbone into two burts, each called a "side." Each

parts, each called a "side." Each side is again divided in two parts

side is again divided in two parts the forequarter and hindquarter. Each quarter is divided into smaller cuts which are sold in the retail market.

Price is based on tenderness, grain of the meat, general appearance and convenience for cooking. Cheapest cuts are shanks, plates and chuck. Many good cook books have charts showing the names of retail cuts and how they should be cooked. Look them over and familiarize yourself with them.

Meat shrinks from '(to'; in cooking. Therefore allow. '4 pound of meat without bone for each serving, and '1, pound of meat consisting of lean, fat and bone, as a minimum for each serving.






