



Biologists Puzzled By Herd's Failure To Increase Rapidly Why isn't the Southern Mich-

igan deer herd increasing at a faster rate? That question is going to get some intensive study beginning this fall, and the first phase of it involves information on bucks killed during the hunting seasoff which begins tomorrow.

Ralph E. Bailey of Jackson, district game supervisor, today asked all hunters who kill deer in Southern Michigan to call his office, STate 4-3188 in Jack-son, collect, to report the fact. A game biologist will be sent to inspect the deer, determine its age, measure its antlers and record its weight. Even if only the head remains, an adequate record can be made, Bailey said.

The Conservation Department hopes to examine at least 500 Southern Michigan bucks this fall, to determine how many deer of each age class are being shot during the fall seasons.

Along with the check on the

buck kill, biologists intend to study such factors as dogs, cars, fences, farm machinery and disease in Southern Mich-igan deer mortality. igan deer mortality.

"This information is vital to management of the Southern Michigan deer herd." Bailey said. "With the high productivity of two fawns from each doe, the herd should be increasing at a faster rate. We want to find out what's holding it down."

Bailey added he is "guessing" that dogs kill a higher percentage of young fawns than is generally realized, and that this may be a reason for the slow rate of increase:

Paul F. Roeder, executive secretary of the association, said that the local organization will need to raise about \$30,000 from the sale of the seals to meet the program it has planned for next year.

The association provides a film service, printed materials, campus-wide health education days at Eastern Michigan University every year, speaking and essay projects among high achool students, monthly TB abstracts to physicians and other professional groups, bulletin board posters to approximately 100 industries and exhibits at conferences, community fairs and public meetings.

It will provide volunteers and promotional materials for next spring's X-ray program to detect tuberculosis and spend \$2,200 on fact finding and research projects here in the county.

This year's Christmas seals show a boy and girl in green and red winter costumes feeding birds and squirrels against a white background. Katherine LaBruce Rowe of Richmond, Va., designed the seals.

Roeder said that more than 200 persons who appeared as individuals and representatives of groups helped the association to prepare the seals for mailing.
