In terms of the average amount of work required to buy a quart of milk, the "price" is 70% less today than it was 45 years ago.

The real price of a quart of milk is measured by the amount of worknot the amount of money—required to obtain it.

In 1914, for example, the average hourly wage earner worked 22.9 minutes to earn the money to buy a quart of milk. (See table.) Today's average wage earner works only 6.8 minutes to earn enough money to buy a quart of milk.

In terms of the work required to obtain it, the same quart of milk "costs" 70% less today than it did 45 years ago.

### You And Your Taxes

Uncle Sam is not the only one spending your tax dollars the billions.

A study of the Historical Summary of Governmental Fin-ances in the U.S. published the Bureau of the Census, shows that local government expenditures have been increasing at the average rate of 9.4 per cent each year-up, up, up until they have reached an estimated \$37.8 billion in 1960. And the upward trend is still



This focus on local spending is brought forth in view of a new program being sponsored in many cities throughout the nation. It is called Home Owner Tax and is designed to arouse the interest of citizens in local government affairs and communicate their views to local officials. It seems particularly timely and worthwhile in view of what's been going on across

From another source, the National Research Bureau, Inc. comes word that the total state and local debt has also been steadily rising, from \$22.7 billion in 1950 to \$54.6 billion in 1958, the last year for which figures are available.

Here's what the National Research Bureau pamphlet adds: "Many state and local governments find themselves faced with tremendous pressures of extended spending. This spending may be in the form of a new school, new road, or relief program. The only way that these programs can be financed through increased revenue. This revenue may come in the form of higher taxes, or in the form of a rise in tax assessments, which amounts to the same thing. The cost will still be borne by the people. This fact makes it absolutely essential that every citizen carefully examine each new spending measure that is introduced into

state and local government." That is basically the same message Home Owner Tax is trying to get across. H.O.T. attempts to induce the taxpayer to make known to his local officials what he does, or does not, want to buy and pay for in local government. When taxpayers are heard, they generally ask for less government spending, reduced taxes and the honest attention of public officials to their problems. H.O.T. was founded on the theory that many local government functions and services can either


