Since this is a new practice, you may want to try it on only a part of your acreage to compare results with spring application. North Central Illinois tests with winter applications have been as effective as band or row treatment using planter attachments. Application can be made with granule applications or applied in combination with fertilzer.

CHECK OATS FOR GERMINATION before planting time. Chances are germination is satisfactory but it's better to make sure than to come out with half a crop. There have been instances where germination has dropped below 50%. If your germination tests a little short you can increase your planting rate 2 bit.



CREEP FEEDING Spring Lambs CREEP FEEDING Spring Lamos.

Many times the extra push of creep feeding can get lambs to market by early summer before markets normally start to slide off.

Still further advantage to creep feeding can be obtained by pelleting the ration. Pellets containing 75% finely chopped high quality alfalfa, 15% ground grain and 10% molasses make it possible to 100 to 110 days.

MIX SECOND CUTTING AL-FALFA AND RED CLOVER with first or third cuttings if you have had problems with "slobber hay". For reasons unknown, second cutting alfalfa and red clover sometimes cause excess starvation among cat-tie. Generally when this occurs, cattle will refuse to eat the hay. You can save this hay by mixing it with other cuttings at the rate of about one-third slobber hay to two-thirds good hay.






