Board of Supervisors are favoring an extension of existing state "nuisance" taxes which are scheduled to lapse June 30 and dividing the receipts between welfare services, higher education and mental health care.

As proposed by the Supervisors Inter-county Committee higher education, mental health care and various groups of governmental units would receive one-third each of the income from the temporary

taxes.
The committee suggests that the taxes be continued temporarily with the understanding they be allocated as proposed. 





ORDINANCE NO. 56

An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 45, "Village of Manchester Zoning Ordinance", to provide for the conversion of existing dwellings into dwellings of more than one family.

THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ORDAINS:

1. That by resolution adopted by the Village Council at a special meeting on March 20, 1961, it was determined that amendment to the "Village of Manchester Zoning Ordinance" was required for the convenience, public necessity and general welfare of the Village of Manchester.

2. That due notice of the proposed amendment was published April 27, 1961, in the Manchester Enterprise, and public hearing was held May 20, 1961, and NO per son appeared to protest against the proposed amendment.

3. That after giving due notice of a public hearing and holding of a public hearing as required by law, the Manchester Village Council at a regular meeting held at the Village Hall in said Village on May 20, 1961, unanimously approved the Amendment of Section 15.02, Article XV, Ordinance No. 45, by adding Subsection 15.02, (e) which reads as follows:

> "15.02(e) The additional right to convert or alter existing, dwellings into dwellings of more than one family is hereby granted, provided, that such conversion or alteration shall not require any major structural change in the exterior of the structure other than required or desirable for ingress to each apartment or dwelling unit to be created."

4. That this Ordinance shall become effective immediately after its adoption, but it is ordered that this Ordinance be published within on-Ordinance be published within one week in the Man-

chester Enterprise ,a newspaper having general circulation in the Village of Manchester.


