Some streets will receive oil seal to keep down the dust, as it s about the same price as cloride and lots more efficient. It is unfortunate that we have to increase our police hours



CHICKEN BROIL SET FOR JULY 20th

Manchester Library

Early on the morning of Thursday 20, some 200 respected and otherwise sensible Manchester citizens will be up getting ready for the big chicken broil which annually serves butterbasted and charcoal-broiled chicken to some 5500 people from Michigan and neighboring states.

As usual, the feast will take place on the Athletic field on the east side of town, beginning about 4 p.m. and continuing until everyone has been served. For weeks now, General Chairman Luther G. Klager, has been making plans. His 21 committee chairmen have been alerted and the food has been ordered.

By mid-morning of the big day. charcoal pits will be in place, two long cement-block pits and two metal sided pits totaling some 150 feet in length, or enough to broil 1200 chicken halves at one time.

The Manchester event has become a showcase for the country, a demonstration of the proper method of serving hot chicken to 5,000 or more guests

HARVEST SMALL GRAIN AT UP TO 20% MOISTURE as long as you have equipment to dry it down to 12% required for safe storage. Reduction in field loss will usually more than offset the cost of drying the grain. In most instances, drying costs won't exceed 6c per bushel. But don't overdry. This will only add to drying costs and reduce the weight of grain you sell.

SEDUCE EGG EREAKAGE by making sure hens get plenty of oyster shell. Reduced appetite often lead to thin shells during hot weather. Problem can be offset by sprinkling oyster shells on top the feed to assure a sufficient calcium intake. You may also want to have your feedman mix one ounce of ascorbic acid per ton of feed to supply vitiamin E which improves shell quality.

MAKE BEST USE OF PASTURE GROWTH for the rest of the season by adjusting grazing methods. Rotate cattle between pastures or fence off sections within the pasture. Also, separate milking cows from the dry cows and replace-

ment heifers so producers get first choice on best grass. Keep and mature grass clipped to make way for new growth.
