




BREED FOR A LARGER LAMB CROP. Start by selecting good rams. One ram in five may be a poor breeder. Pick healthy rams having good conferm tion and free of physical defects. To make sure of rams, it's a good idea to have their semen tested before turning them in with the ewes. About two weeks before breeding begins, start feeding ewes one-half pound of grain per head per day. Also shear the rams and frim the ewes around their docks.

MOW OR GRAZE NEW SEEDINGS DURING LATE SUMMER if growth has been good this season and it's likely to bloom before cold weather sets in. New seedings stand a better chance of surviving through the winter if they are not allowed to bloom the first season, especially red clover. But clip and remove growth in plenty of time so seedlings will go, into winter with plenty of top growth and root reserves.

PAY STRICT ATTENTION TO EGG HANDLING during this time of year. Unless you do, the portion you sell as Grade A's is ilikely to slip off. Gather eggs at least four or five times a day and get them cool as soon as possible. Keep the egg room as near to 50 to 60 degrees and 70% to 80% humidity as conditions allow. Cool egg cases, fillers and flats before packing eggs in them. Eggs may lose up to a pound of moisture when packed in a dry, warm, 30-dozen case.







#### NAPOLEON'S NEWEST INDUSTRY GETS ON TO BUILD **AIRPLANES**

The wheels are beginning to turn at Napoleon's newest industry-an airplane factory at the B.D. Maule Airport. After 4 years of plowing through governmental testing, owner B. D. Maule of Napoleon has begun production of a 145 horsepower high wing plane which he'll name

the "Big Dee M 4". During the four-year span in which he applied for the certificate to produce the plane Maule said he spent about \$50,000 in carrying out load and flight tests and in complying with numerous FAA regulations. A complete set of blueprints for each part of the airplane also had to be complet-

Maule, along with 5 other workers has already manufactured landing gear and wings for 10 airplanes along with fuselages. He hopes to produce from 15 to 20 of the planes the first year of operation and maybe 100 by next year. The plane will cruise at 150 miles per hour and have wing span of 29 feet 8 inches, a length of 22 feet and a gross weight of 2,100 pounds. The craft will carry 42 gallons of gasoline and will sell for \$8,500.
