

HANDLE FEEDER CATTLE WITH CARE for 1 to 3 weeks after they arrive in your feedlot. This can mean a big difference in shrink and how efficiently they'll go on feed. Move newly shipped feeders to restraining pens awa" from other cattle to forcee them to rest. Watch them closely for any outbreak of shipping fever, or other disease, and treat immediately. After cattle appear to be fully rested, they can be put on pasture, stalk fields or a full feed in the

Realance FIELD LOSSES WITH DRY-ING COSTS in deciding at what moisture you should begin harvesting corn that you plan to dry. Granted, losses are normally lowest when corn is harvested at around 30 per cent moisture. But this adds to the cost of drying corn to the safe storage level, compared with when corn is harvested after it dries a little more in the field. This will depend upon your particular costs. But normally it is within the 23 per cent to 27 per cent moisture range.




GET THE MOST FROM YOUR FEED DOLLAR, Feed cows individually according to their production ability. There may well be some cows in your herd that would do better if more concentrates were included in their ration. You're money ahead so long as the increase in milk produced by a particular cow will more than offset the extra cost of the feed. Better look over production records and see what cows appear to have a potential of more milk.

RATS CAN COST YOU MONEY. Over a year's time, one rat alone can consume, waste and damage \$20 worth of grain. Cover areas where rats may gain entrance to grain bins with screen. Place some of the many types of bait stations about the farmstead. Put about 6 to 8 ounces of bait such as warfarin in each station.



GRICULTURE CTION

by M. L. Woell MICHIGAN . FARM

Under Michigan's Horton Trespass Law, it is unlawful to hunt on private lands without the owner's permission. Failure to secure the farm owner's permission to hunt has caused more strained farmer-sportsman relations than any other cause. Here are some hunting suggestions by Dan Reed, of the Public Affairs division of the Michigan Farm Bureau:

Don't gang up on the farmer. After getting permission to hunt, park your car in the farmer's yard, where it will be out of the way. Learn the exact boundaries of

the farmer's lands to prevent trespassing on adjoining prop-Keep your dog under control at all times and on a leash when

not actually hunting. Always close gates. If you do cause property or livestock damage, report it to the farmer and take full res-

ponsibility. As a final admonition, Reed suggests that sportsmen thank their farm "host" after the hunt, and that they make an effort to maintain friendship throughout the year, not just during the fall hunting season.




