



Banana Cream Pie That's Different

GLAZED CREAM PUFF PIE

1 package Jello-O Vanilla Pudding and Pie Filling 1 package raspberry-flavored gelatin 8 to 12 ice cubes 1 baked 9-inch Puff Pie Shell,

l banana Combine pie filling mix and milk in saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil. Cool only about 5 minutes, stirring once or twice.

Pour into Puff Pie Shell. Chill. Dissolve gelatin completely in boiling water. Add ice cubes and stir constantly for 2 to 3 minutes, or until gelatin starts to thicken. Remove unmelted ice. Slice banana over pie filling. Cover with gelatin. Chill until set-about 30 minutes. Gar nish with sweetened whipped cream, if desired.

To make Puff Pie Shell, combine ¼ cup butter or other shortening and ½ cup

boiling water in saucepan. Bring again to a boil. Reduce heat and add ½ cup sifted flour all at once, stirring rapidly. Cook and stir until mixture pulls away from sides of pan in smooth compact mass—takes about 2 minutes. Remove from heat. Add 2 eggs-one at a time, beating thoroughly after each. Then beat steadily until mixture is satiny and breaks off when spoon is raised. Spread dough evenly over bottom and sides of a 9-inch pie pan and pile remain-

ing dough around rim. Bake in hot oven (425°F.) 35 minutes. Remove from oven and prick bottom and sides with a fork. Bake another 5 minutes, or until dry and


