




need a different number for any reason. This is necessary to meet the ever-growing demand for more phone service throughout the U.S. There just aren't enough usable easilyunderstood letter-numeral combinations to go around. On the other hand, there are far more all-numeral combinations available.

You'll get accustomed to the new numbers as more and more people have them. Eventually everyone will have seven-numeral numbers. You'll find, too, that they will eliminate frequent misunderstandings of letters and numerals that sound or look somewhat alike. And they'll lead to marvelous improvements in your telephone service in the future.

STUFFED ROCK CORNISH GAME HENS

1/2 pound mushrooms (chopped) or 6 oz. can

2 cup finely-chopped celery  $\frac{1}{3}$  cup butter or margarine 1 ( $\frac{31}{2}$  oz.) can 0 & C French

2 cups small stale bread

1/2 teaspoon rosemary 1/8 teaspoon pepper 4 Rock Cornish Game Hens 1/4 cup soft butter or mar-

Saute mushrooms and celery in 1/3 cup of butter or margarine until mushrooms are tender but not browned. Add crushed canned French fried onions, bread cubes, salt, rosemary and pepper. Mix well. (If you wish a more moist dressing, add a little warm water.) Stuff hens with mixture. Fasten with wooden picks or skewers. Lace closed with string.

Brush hens with the ¼ cup of soft butter or margarine. Wrap each hen in single piece of aluminum foil; place in a shallow pan and roast at 425 degrees for 35 minutes. Open foil and brush hens with drippings. Poast 25 minutes longer or until hens are goldenbrown. Prepare and serve extra dressing if


