POULTRY LICE COST YOU MONEY. Production of hens with lice often shows a decline of 10% or higher. An lowa study recorded a 15% loss in egg production over a 14-week period. The longer birds go untreated, the larger will be the losses. During the first month losses are slight. But after that, the lice population increases rapidly. You can effectively use a 4% malathon dust applied to the nesting material and litter if lice are present in your flock.



SAVE ON YOUR HEAT BILL. It isn't necessary to warm all the surrounding air to keep engines warm or water pipes from freezing. Dip stick electrical heaters for oil reservoirs, heat lamps, electrical heating tape and heating units which fit cooling systems eliminate the need for this.
