Voters to Decide Liquor By-the-Glass Issue

Voters here will be asked to decide whether liquor should be sold by the glass in Manches ter at the same time they cast their ballots for village officers on March 12.

Marx has certified that a petition circulated by Mrs. Ada H. Shannon and Fred Rumler, co-owners of the Rumler and Sharron Tavern, bore an adequate number of signatures of qualified electors to place the issue on the bullot.

The petition, filed with the clerk in January, bore 105 signatures. The law requires signatures of 35 percent of the number who voted for all candidates for the office of village president in the last election, to place a question on the ballot ense if the ballot proposition by petition. The liquor-by-theglass petition would therefore

have had to have been signed by at least 94 electors.

The by-glass liquor issue was defeated in a Manchester township election last fall, and it was defeated in a village election about 12 years ago. Also on March 12 ballots will

be candidates for the offices of village president, clerk and assessor and for three Village Council seats.

Marx said the candidates will be chosen by party caucuses, probably on Feb. 19th.

The Progressive Party and the Citizens' Party are each expected to offer a full slate of candidates.

Manchester would be eligible for one liquor-by-the-glass licis approved by the voters.



Hospital aid could be given more quickly to victims of automobile accidents if information about their blood group classification were instantly available to doctors and operating room technicians.

Secretary of State James M. Hare believes that few automobile drivers are taking the precaution of recording their blood bype in the space provided for this information on the reverse side of their driver lic-

In urging all motorists to write this data on their licenses, Hare cautioned them to be absolutely sure that they were recording the correct blood type since the transfusion of the wrong type of blood can be fatal.
