With its everexpanding humanitarian ser-

vices, the Red Cross has out grown its rented space. To meet this long overdue need, the Washtenaw Chapter pounds in a lifetime are; Bob inaugurated a low-pressure drive last spring for \$200,000 to build a new headquarters on Packard Road. During the rest of the year, without any great amount of publicity, the drive

FINAL DRIVE FOR RED CROSS PROPOSED NEW RED CROSS HEADQUARTERS. The new Red Cross Headquarters will be located on Packard Road next to Buhr Park. It will be modern and flexible, but without luxury, and will have room to expand as the need grows. Movable metal partitions will permit changing room size.

The present drive, Mr. Tapping explains, is not a part of the annual Community Fund drive. In the Manchester Community Fund, money is collected for local and national humanitarian services. It pays for the running expenses for these services.

The Building Fund drive, on the other hand, is for muchneeded capital improvement. It is not repeated. The Manchester Committee plans to conduct and complete its share of the drive

Pictures in this issue of the Enterprise show the proposed headquarters and its location. The building will greatly help the work of the 75 Manchester Red Cross volunteers who serve the daily needs of the people in this area.

Add carrots cut into chunks, onions and raisins to lamb shanks. Simmer until vegetables are tender, about 30 minutes. Skim any fat from surface. Mix cornstarch with cold water and stir into liquid. Cook until mixture boils thoroughly and is thickened. Arrange ment and vegetables on serving platter and cover with sauch. Makes 4 servings.
